Rote, Superintendent of the public schools, has appointed next Monday and Tuesday as the dates upon which to test the qualifications of applicants for the vacant positions in the city schools. Prof. Rote and the city school board will examine the candidates.

He took him home at once, and the parents were almost as pleased as if they had received a fortune or had "struck it."

The Three Gregorios. Sheriff McCall was advised yesterday that three Mexicans were in custody at Laredo on suspicion of being Gregorio Gonzalez, who attempted to murder his wife or paramour, Juana Ruiz. Means are being taken to secure the identification of the suspected parties.
