

**MAINE LAW IN MISSOURI.**  
The martial law established by the St. Louis Greys, some time last winter on the 17th section of the Pacific railroad, is being vigorously enforced further west by our ex-Lieutenant Governor. Vide the *Boonville Observer* of the 25th.

We heard related a few days since that some fellow had possessed himself of a license to sell liquor and squatted down in a shanty on the line where Gen. T. Price had his headquarters on the Pacific Railroad. In a short time the consequence was a drunken row, heads broke, black eyes and bloody noses. Gen. Price went to the man and represented to him the injury he was doing him, stating he would rather abandon the work than to have such scenes constantly occurring, and requested him to desist. But the man pulled out his license and a permit from the owner of the land to use it, and defied him. Upon which Gen. Price seized an axe knocked in all the heads of his barrels and let out his liquor, and informed him that he would serve all who attempted to do as he had done, on this section of the work, in the same way.
