A QUEEN'S HEN HOUSE.

The country house or place of the Queen of England is at Windsor, of the many curious things about it is the fowl-yard, of the accommodations provided for hens and chickens. We do not suppose these feathered lords and ladies are any happier than their neighbors who roost independently on an old apple tree, lay their eggs in the hay-mow, and lead their broods about in the humble door-yard. No wonder that hens who have model roosting houses and winter courts, should sometimes need hospitals. Give us we say, in behalf of crowing and clucking friends—give us the open field and the clear air, and the rattling yellow corn, we will not envy the Queen's fiddies cooped up in the palace yard with wire fences.—[Youth's Penny Gazette.

In a secluded nook on the borders of the Home Park, sheltered from the prevailing winds by stately clumps of elm trees, stands the Home Farm, or the farm attached to Windsor Castle, the private farm of Queen Victoria. In this establishment, which was founded by George III. is situated the royal fowl house and poultry yard.

The fowl house is a semi-Gothic building of simple and appropriate beauty. It consists of a central pavilion, used for inspecting the fowls, crowded on the top by an elegant dove cot, and on the sides of wings capable of symmetric extension, in which are placed the model roosting houses, and laying and breeding nests of the fowls.

The ground in front slopes toward the Park, and is enclosed and divided by light wire fences into separate yards, for the "run" or daily exercise of the birds. Inside those yards, gravel walks, bordered by grass plots, lead to the entrance of the fowl house. In the proportions, distribution and fittings of the apartment at this house considerable knowledge of the habits, with corresponding and most commendable regard to the convenience of these gregarious tenants, has been displayed. The chambers are spacious and airy, and of an equal rather warm temperature, which accords with their original habits, and their nests are made as far as possible to resemble the dark, bramble covered recesses of their original jungles.

PORK TRADE.

We insert in our columns to-day, what we characterized yesterday, "as a sensible article from the Cincinnati Gazette on the Crop of Hogs in the West." This article was written in June, but is applicable, we think, to the present date.—[St. Louis Int.

CROPS AND HOGS IN THE WEST.

We have, within the past ten days, conversed with several individuals connected with our mercantile houses, who have been traveling in business in the States of Illinois, Michigan, Indiana and Kentucky, as well as through our own State, and the accounts they give of the crops, all seem to agree that the grain crop, such as barley, oats and wheat, present a most promising appearance, and that the yield from these crops will be, in all probability, very large.—Corn, likewise, looked very well, and the weather continues to be extremely favorable for the full development of not only this, but all other kinds of cereal crops. Wheat, barley, and rye, is almost, if not quite out of danger, so that we may safely, we think, come to the conclusion that the crops of the present year, will be uncommonly large in the Western States. We also have ascertained that there is considerable excitement in various parts of those States, in regard to the prices hogs may rule at the coming winter, and that quite a speculative feeling was manifested—three and one-half dollars per cwt., gross being freely paid for stock hogs.

The feeling is no doubt, predicated upon the high rates which have been obtained for Pork this season; as it is a very common rule, and we may say a fatal error, which agriculturists generally adopt, or fall into, under all such circumstances, that high prices one season lead to high prices the next season; now this is not only an erroneous theory, but the very reverse is almost always the case. It sometimes happens, that in consequence of a continued failure in the crops of any article, that high rates may be sustained for a series of years, but this is an exception, and can have but little application in the case of the Corn crop, and the supply and demand for Hogs.

Should the present, or even somewhat lower rates, be sustained for the hog product until the coming in of the new supply, (and we have but little doubt that they will, particularly for Pork and Lard) we have no doubt but that the Hog trade the coming winter will open at high rates; but the important question to be considered is, can such rates be sustained?

Cure for Drunkenness.

The following singular means of curing habitual drunkenness, is employed by a Russian physician, Dr. Scrieber, of Brzesze Liteski. It consists in confining a drunkard in a room, and furnishing him at discretion with brandy diluted with two-thirds of water; as much wine, beer, coffee, as he desires, but containing one-third of brandy; and the feed, the bread, the meat, &c., are steeped in brandy and water. On the fifth day of this regimen he has a disgust for brandy, and earnestly requests other diet; but his disease must not be yielded to, until the poor wretch no longer desires to eat or drink. He is then certainly cured of his penchant for drunkenness. He requires such a disgust for brandy that he is ready to vomit at the very sight of it.
