BOATS WILL LAND HERE.

THIS WILL BE TRANSFER POINT FOR THROUGH FREIGHT

The White Bluffs and Columbia River Company Will Make This Their Headquarters and Erect Coal Bunkers, Warehouses and Offices at Landings at This Place.

As announced in Monday Daily Courier a meeting was held last night in Prof. Nutts school room for the purpose of discussing with Mr. Cover the locating of wharves and warehouses on this side of the river for the accomodation of his line of steamboats that will ply the river between here and The Dalles and Priest Rapids.

Quite a number of our business men turned out to the meeting and talked the matter over with the result that it was decided to donate to the company sufficient land on which to erect all buildings necessary for the transaction of their business here.

This means that Kennewick is to be the transfer point for all freight that comes in by rail to be shipped either up or down the river, or that comes in by boat to be shipped east or west on the railroad, as the railroad company has promised the promoters of the line that they would locate their transfer spur on this side of the river in case the boat company made satisfactory arrangements.

The company was very reasonable in its requests, considering the benefit such an enterprise will be to the city.

Its Name is Benton.

The new town up the river has at last been given a name. It is to be known as Benton in honor of the new county. Mr. Amon informs us that the name was suggested by several of those who answered his call for a name, and he has concluded to decide who shall have the lot by drawing the names of those who considered that an appropriate name from a hat, the last name out to be the winner. He expects to have the lots on the market next week and as his new boat will be here about the middle of the week he contemplates running an excursion to the new town and give it an appropriate christening.

Material Arrives For New Bridge.

The Northern Pacific is getting the material on the ground for the new bridge across the Columbia at this place. It is expected work will start about the first of August, when a crew of a hundred men will rush the work through with all possible speed. The present superstructure will be raised several feet and the traffic will go on undisturbed while the new bridge is being constructed below. One span at a time will be removed and replaced by a new one. The new bridge will be steel throughout and will be one of the finest in the west.

Will Haul the Children.

Some time ago the school board advertised in the Courier for bids for the job of hauling the scholars from Section Seven to the school house in this city. At its meeting held Thursday evening the contract was awarded to C. H. Putnam, who will begin Monday morning. The stage will make its trip in such a manner that none of the scholars living in that portion of the district will have to walk any great distance.
