## FROM ABROAD.

Paris, May 23, '05.

My dear sister Kate: At last we are in Paris, a city I have always wanted to see. At present she is decked in all her holiday regalia in honor of the little King of Spain, who will arrive tomorrow. We will try and get a peep at him if it is possible, am afraid there will be an awful crowd on the streets when he arrives. Kate, I wish you could see the autos and carriages to say nothing of the people, about five-thirty or six p. m. on the Champs-Elysees and the Bois de Boulogne, both fashionable drives. Of course the gowns are lovely and the women beautiful, the French have a style all their own which is difficult for others to imitate.

Yesterday was Sunday and we spent a very pleasant day bobbing from place to place. Went to the top of the Eiffel Tower, changed elevators three times to make the ascent, quite a novel experience being lifted so high in the air. It is nine hundred eighty seven feet high, the highest structure in the world.

"Buffalo Bill's" wild west show is in town so of course we had to see it, it was very good indeed. He has the real thing in the way of rough riders, cow boys, U. S. artillery boys and the American Indian, am afraid the French people don't know how to appreciate a show of that kind.

Must tell you a little about our trip through Switzerland. It was very entrancing to be among the wonderful snow clad peaks of that country. On our return from Germany to Lucerne we only remained there a few days but in that time we made the ascent to Mt. Pilatus by Funicular a height of seven thousand feet. It was a most shivery sensation, the grade is something frightful, if anything should give way one would be dashed to pieces on the rocks, thousands of feet below. While up there had all kinds of weather, thunder and lightning, hail, snow, rain and sunshine, all in the space of two hours. From Lucerne we went to Interlaken a very charming little place besides being a very fashionable resort.

Had a magnificent view of the famous Jungfrau, which looms thirteen thousand feet into the air, also made the ascent part way.

June 2nd. Was unable to finish this the other day will try and do so now. Harry is taking a good snooze while I write. Well we have almost finished seeing Paris and expect to leave for London about June sixth. Suppose you read in the papers of the plot to kill King Alfonso of Spain while visiting Paris. The papers are full of it here they say they have caught the man who did it.

By the way, we saw the King and President Loubet yesterday by mere accident, they look very much the same as other people.

Yesterday was a busy day for us as we visited Napoleon First's tomb which is very fine. The sarcophagus is hewn out of a single block of Siberian porphyry, the "Parthenon" the burial place of other celebrities of France, and the church of Notre Dame, to finish the day we went to the races. They did not seem like the races at home. In the first place Harry paid twenty francs, (that is four dollars) for himself, and ten francs (two dollars) for me, to enter the grounds; six dollars in all. The people do not seem to take much interest in the races, but simply go to show off their clothes and bet. One thing sure they have the clothes to show.

One place I must mention is the Palace and Picture Gallery of the Louvre. The rooms are so numerous it takes two hours to walk through them without stopping, on two sides it covers seven blocks on one end three making seventeen blocks in all. Don't you pity us having all that immense place to go through.

Harry says for me to tell you we will sail from Liverpool on the Steamship Cedric, August fourth for U. S. reaching there about the eleventh.
