ing of sidewalk, or sidewalks shall be charged against the said property together with the cost of serving said notice and become a lien against and be collected in the same manner as taxes are levied and collected according to the laws of the state of Washington.

Section 8. Said notice shall be served by the town marshal or his deputies, and his return shall be made thereon, and filed with the clerk. If the owner or owners of any lot or lots within said district cannot be found or are not residents of the state of Washington, then service shall be made upon them in the same manner as is provided by the laws of the state of Washington relative to the service of summons, so far as it may be convenient and applicable in this case.

Section 9. The clerk, after receiving the marshal's return of owners to property as "not found" shall publish the said notice in the official paper of the town of Kennewick for the same period as required for the publication of summons in civil proceedings of the state of Washington, or if personal service by mail can be had, such service shall be made according to the statute of the state of Washington for the service by mail of summons in civil proceedings.

Section 10. If within ten days after the service is completed, if the owner, or owners of any property shall fail or refuse to build said sidewalk or sidewalks according to specifications on file with the clerk and in accordance with the terms of said notice, and the ordinance thereon in force relating to sidewalks, the town council shall order the same to be built according to the said estimates and specifications, and the cost of building, constructing, altering or repairing the same together with the cost of service of said notice shall become a charge against the said property, and a lien against the same, and shall be levied and collected in the same manner as taxes are levied and collected upon real estate according to the laws of the state of Washington.

Section 11. The owner, or owners of any lot or lots, within the said district, who have not constructed altered or repaired, the sidewalks across, or alongside their said properties, may within the time specified in the said notice, tender to the town clerk, the amount specified in the said notice for the building and constructing the sidewalk or sidewalks in said notice mentioned, who shall accept the said money and give his receipt therefor, and such parties shall be exempt from any further charges, provided, that the expenses of personal service outside of the state, and service by publication shall be taxed as costs, in addition to the estimates for the building of the sidewalks, and the town council shall proceed to build the same according to specifications.

Section 12. The accounts of moneys collected or expended in any manner connected with the building, altering, or repairing sidewalks within the said sidewalk improvement district shall constitute a separate fund, and shall be kept separate and apart from the other moneys of the town.

Section 13. The clerk shall be in full possession of the said ordinance after its passage and shall publish the same in the official newspaper of the town of Kennewick, on the 15th day of July 1905. Approved July 6th, 1905.

Schoolma'ams Capture Western Fair.

While not officially so designated by the department of special events and entertainment, this has been schoolma'am week at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. There have been schoolma'ams of high and low degree, of youthful and uncertain age, and they have seen and enjoyed the fair and everything appertaining thereto from the art display to the shows on the trail. The schoolteachers came for the most part in parties, as successful contestants in various popularity contests.

The first to arrive were about twenty-five from San Francisco, sent by the Leuben-Weinstock Co and they were accounted exceeding fair to look upon. On Thursday a party of thirty, guests of the Boston Herald, hailing from all parts of New England, arrived for a several days' stay. Included in the party was one teacher who has devoted fifty years to her profession, and two others who can claim nearly forty years in the harness. The New England women confessed that they had expected to find Oregon somewhat of a wilderness and were surprised at the marvellous progress which the western country has attained. They were enthusiastic also in their praise of the fair being especially delighted with its ideal setting. A party of nine teachers from Illinois, who came Friday, were preceded by a story printed in a morning paper to the effect that the young women had broken many hearts in Butte, where they stopped over for a day and went underground in two of Senator Clark's mines. The story which Portland swains read on the morning of the Illinois teachers' arrival was to the effect that six of the nine had received proposals of marriage and that one, Miss Christine Keany, had been proposed to by a man with half a million to his credit.
