Government Agreement that Yakima Valley Water Users must Sign

A mass meeting of Yakima citizens was held Saturday night at which there was an attendance of about 100 business men and a number of farmers. Speeches were made by Congressman Jones, Engineer Noble, Fred Parker, Vestal Snyder and others. Mr. Noble spoke in behalf of the reclamation service. He said nothing could be done in the Yakima valley until the water users had signed the agreements that had been prepared by the government to settle the water rights.

The following resolutions were proposed and adopted:

"Whereas, The representatives of the reclamation department of the government of the United States are now engaged in the investigation of the watersheds and stream systems of the Yakima valley, with a view to the construction of storage reservoirs to store and conserve the waters of said watershed and make the same available for irrigation purposes; and

"Whereas, In order to enable the government to expeditiously carry on such examination and irrigation projects it is necessary for the existing rights of the users of water from said stream systems to be fixed and defined; and,

"Whereas, An agreement has been submitted by the government recognizing the right of all present users of water to the extent of one cubic foot of water per second of time for each 80 acres of land to be irrigated; provided that the aggregate amount of water so claimed does not exceed the natural flow of the Yakima river during the low water period. Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that said proposition is equitable and reasonable and

should be accepted by the people of the Yakima valley to the end that these great projects may be successfully carried out, thereby that a lasting benefit be conferred upon all the people of the Yakima valley."

Ordinance No. 37.

An Ordinance Regulating and Preventing obstruction to Sidewalks.

Be it ordained by the Council of the town of Kennewick:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to ride a bicycle, tricycle or other vehicle upon any sidewalk within the corporate limits of the town of Kennewick.

No person shall drive, wheel or draw upon any sidewalk any vehicle, except hand carriages for children, and barrows and trucks for the purpose of delivering goods.

Section 3. No person shall intentionally ride, lead or drive any animal or animals on any of the sidewalks of the town.

Section 4. A violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof the offender shall be fined in any sum not exceeding fifty (50) dollars.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in the official newspaper of the town.
