The sentiment is rapidly growing that the federal government should not issue license for the sale of liquor in local option or prohibition territory. In continuing to issue such license it is in effect abetting the violation of local and state laws. Statesmen in all parties are awakening to that fact.

This is the time of year when because of recurring national anniversaries we hear a great deal of talk about being ready to die for one's country. Fortunately there is no demand now for that sacrifice, but to live for one's country is always better order. This is always best done by obedience to its laws, reverence for its institutions, the cheerful performance of the duties of citizenship, and a clean upright and useful life.

Incidentally the Yukon-Alaska-Pacific Exposition reminds how near at one time this country came to losing all that magnificent territory now embraced in the states of Washington and Oregon. Webster and other of our statesmen at that period strangely thought that country would not support more than a few roving hunters and were not unwilling to let Great Britain have it. Fortunately Whitman and a few others, who knew its possibilities managed to persuade the government at Washington and so a splendid empire was saved. But it was a close call.

Orville and Wilbur Wright were accorded a well deserved right on their return from Europe. Progress in aerial navigation has been very rapid the past two or three years and the Wrights have done the most to advance it and at the same time its popularity by their wonderful achievements. So great has been the triumphs already gained that even the most sceptical as to the availability and dirigible balloons are by this time convinced. Of course there is yet much to be done, and apparently aerial navigation will always be risky in spite of coming improvements. Their value for military purposes is still uncertain for that is something that can not possibly be ascertained without actual warfare.

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

PRETTY AND PRACTICABLE TEA TRAY

Take a piece of satin of any shade harmonious with the color scheme of the table or room; place a small lace doily in the center, and frame this in an oval gilt frame. (These frames can be found in any of the department stores, sometimes with inexpensive pictures in them, for twenty-five cents.) A piece of white linen with either the doily or an embroidered initial in the center framed in a white enameled frame also makes a handsome tray. The glass is easily wiped off and the linen remains as spotless as before it was used. A piece of felt may be glued on the bottom of the tray to prevent scratching or marring the table in any way.

The work of skinning onions, which usually ends in tears, can be made a pleasure by pouring boiling water over them and covering a few minutes before peeling.

The following method does away with fishy dishes, disagreeable odors etc: Clean and wash the fish thoroughly salt, pepper, and flour it inside and out (sparingly), then roll in manilla paper at least three times. Pinch the ends of the paper together then fold back, and pin securely, to prevent the escape of the juices. Bake in a moderate oven and allow

fifteen minutes more than if baking the same fish in a pan. When ready to serve, remove the paper, to which the skin will adhere, and place the delicious, juicy meat upon the platter. Garnish as desired.

TWO PREVENTATIVES AGAINST MOTHS

Take one fourth of an ounce each of ground cloves and caraway seed, one ounce of dried common salt, one half pound of lavender flowers free from the stalk and one half ounce each of dried thyme and mint. Mix well together, and put in cambric or silk bags. These scent bags, if placed among clothes, will preserve them from moths and give a pleasant odor.

If you are troubled with moths in the house, try putting blotting paper well saturated with turpentine in the drawers, among the furs and bedclothes, or wherever there is any danger of the moths working their depredations; it can even be put along the edges of carpets. Turpentine is the best preventative of moths I have discovered.

QUEEN MACAROONS

Mix the beaten whites of six eggs with the yolks of four; add one cupful of sugar and flour and a small quantity coriander seed. Drop on greased paper, and bake in a moderate oven.

PUFFED FRENCH FRIED POTATOES

Fry in the usual way until just before they are done. Then lift the frying basket of chips out of the fat let it cool for a few seconds and plunge it back into it again. The change of temperature will make the chips puff up.

Scrap Soup—Boil in enough water for the soup, a sliced potato, small carrot, a stalk of celery, a little tomato and a handful of rice or barley. You may add baked beans (a leftover) if you like. The vegetables must all be minced. When they are cooked tender, cut some bacon into tiny cubes and fry to a nice brown, thicken the fat with a teaspoonful of browned flour and turn all into the soup pot. Salt and pepper to taste. Boil for a minute and serve without straining and you have a palatable family broth.

Pie Crust Made with Lard—Place in a bowl one and a half cupfuls of flour, one-quarter of a cupful of butter, the same amount of lard and one small teaspoonful of salt. With a sharp knife chop the shortening through the flour very thoroughly, after which add just enough ice water, or very cold water, to hold the mixture together (from one-quarter to one-half a cupful is sufficient), chopping all the time until a smooth dough is formed, which should be allowed to stand in a cold place for a day before using.

Pastry for One Pie.—Mix one saltspoonful of salt and one saltspoonful of baking-powder with one heaping cupful of pastry flour, and rub in one-quarter of a cupful of lard. Mix quite stiff with cold water. Roll out and put little pieces of butter about the size of beans on the paste, until you see about one-quarter of a cupful; sprinkle with flour and fold over and roll out again. Roll up like jelly roll. Divide in two parts and roll to fit the plate.

The temperature of the oven is very important matter and that must be considered if you wish your pie to be wholesome. Nothing is quite so indigestible as a sticky baked pie; and one that has been baked too quickly with the crust burned and the filling half done, is almost as bad. Most pies are better for being baked in a moderate oven. Apple and mince need about an hour, squash and pumpkin about as long, berry pies about forty minutes, stewed rhubarb and
