H. A. Hover will commence the construction of a new hotel adjoining the present one. The new structure will be 36x70 feet and will contain twenty-six commodious rooms. On the first floor will be an elegant ladies' parlor, dining room, office and sample room for the traveling men.

C. A. Lundy has just completed sinking a well in the Horse Heaven country, 13 miles southwest of town. He struck a good flow at a depth of 18 feet. This is welcome news to the people who have located in that section, as the "bug-bear" out there has been that water could not be reached within several hundred feet.
