WENATCHEE RIVER IS HARNESSSED

The Gap in the Big Dam was Closed Yesterday Morning

Yesterday morning, between eight and ten o'clock the gap in the big dam, through which the water of the Wenatchee river has been surging and tumbling in protest of the restraint that has been put on it for the past month, was closed, and by the time this paper gets to its readers the water will be passing through four of the gates that have been made in the dam structure for the passage of the water.

The building of a dam across a river of the size and character of the Wenatchee is no small undertaking, and is attended with no small risk. The work can only be done in the winter, during the low stages of water. There is constant danger that a rise in the river may wash out the work of months. So far the work on this one has been under the most favorable circumstances, and at present there is very little danger of damage. It will take from six weeks to two months longer to complete the work, which can, however, now be pursued leisurely.

Mr. A. E. Downing, the engineer in charge of the work, has promised to furnish the Echo with a detailed account of the work, which in connection with several half tones we are having made, will give our readers a good idea of the work.
