Two years ago last March William H. Lindert, a young man, left Minnesota for the west with about \$200 cash in his inside pocket. After loitering at several points enroute he finally reached here on St. Patrick's day, drove out towards Leahy, picked out a homestead hard by, filed on the same, and took an inventory of what was left of the pile he had when he left Jim Hill's state. He found he had less than \$10. Next day he went to work for Judge T. W. Lane on Pleasant Hill for \$35 a month. Worked there two months and then rented the place, at the same time agreeing to pay Mr. Lane \$500 for his outfit of farming machinery, stock and the like. He summer fallowed the place last year and put in the crop this year. In the meantime he rented Corneli & Valentine's state land and greatly improved his homestead. As a result of less than 18 months' work Mr. Lindert has \$1,000 in cash; horses, wagons and farm machinery worth fully \$1,000 in the open market, and improvements on his homestead worth \$500, besides plenty of hay and grain for his stock for the next ten months. Next year he will devote most of his attention to his homestead. Such is life in northern Douglas county.—Bridgeport Post.
