The Standard Oil Co. Fined \$5000

If the verdict of a Sumner county, Tennessee, jury stands the test in the supreme court the Standard Oil Company is prohibited from doing any further business in the state of Tennessee. A jury said last week by its verdict in the case of the state of Tennessee vs the Standard Oil Company, that this company had violated the anti-trust law of the state, which was enacted by the legislature of 1903, and which provides that "every foreign corporation that violates any of the provisions of this act is hereby denied the right to do and is prohibited from doing business in this state."
