A Queer Tangle

Dispatches in the daily press from Chelan, last Saturday, relate a remarkable condition of affairs in regard to J. A. McArthur, of Entiat, the republican nominee for county commissioner from the third district. By some error the name of A. H. McArthur was printed on the ballots instead of J. A. McArthur. By a strange coincidence there is an A. H. McArthur, who lives at Chelan Falls. The dispatch from Chelan is as follows:

A most remarkable situation has developed in Chelan county over the results of the county commissioner's vote from the Third district, because electors voted for a man not nominated for office. The man who was nominated by the republican county convention seems certain to lose the office, although a majority of electors thought they were voting for him. His democratic rival, who received a smaller vote may be entitled to the office under the law. He also became the father of twins on election day.

Rev. J. A. McArthur, of Entiat, was the republican nominee of the county convention, but when the names of the nominees were printed on the official ballot an error was made and the line on the ballot read: "For county commissioner, Third district, A. H. McArthur." By an overwhelming majority the nominee was chosen for the office, and there is an A. H. McArthur at Chelan Falls, who now claims he has been elected commissioner and is ready to qualify for the office.

The election law is interpreted to mean that only regular nominees of a political convention or persons nominated by petition may be placed on an official ballot and voted for. Politicians and lawyers all over the county are taking sides in the dispute, the friends of the preacher declaring he should be given the office, as the electors thought they were voting for him. Friends of A. H. McArthur declare that election authorities cannot go "behind the returns," and that the returns show that he has been duly elected.

The democrats may come forward and claim the election for Charles Colver, as he seems to have been the only duly qualified nominee on the ticket, but Mr. Colver has as yet made no claims to the office, his entire time being taken up with the parental duties which devolve upon a man who suddenly finds himself the father of twins.

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
