\$16,500 REAL ESTATE DEAL.

Nick Kincherf Sells 280 Acres Adjoining Town--Will be Divided Into Small Tracts.

John B. Adams was instrumental in bringing M. Swartout, a real estate dealer from Everett, and our dairyman, Nick Kincherf, together this week on a real estate deal which will result in much good to our town.

The land adjoins the town on the north side of the track and will be subdivided into five acre tracts and placed on the market at an early date. This will be one of the most attractive additions yet platted. A large spring coming out of the hill near by supplies enough water to irrigate all the tillable land. MASS MEETING ACTS

Full Municipal Ticket Nominated
Wednesday Night

PASSED OFF HARMONIOUSLY

The Citizens Ticket Will Be Presented to the Voters Together With the Question of Incorporating Leavenworth

The mass meeting of citizens which was called for Wednesday night at the opera house to take action in the matter of deciding whether it was advisable to nominate a municipal ticket before the order for the election was issued, was well attended and passed off most harmoniously.

The meeting was called to order by Deed H. Mayar, chairman of the corporation committee. Mr. H. E. Carr was elected chairman and S. C. Woldenberg secretary.

After the object of the meeting was explained and the statute under which it proposed to incorporate had been read by L. J. Nelson, the meeting promptly decided without opposition that in compliance with the law it was necessary to make nominations for the various elective offices under the corporation.

Dr. G. W. Hoxsey, F. A. Losekamp and Deed H. Mayar were placed in nomination for the office of mayor. The vote was taken by ballot and stood Mayar 30, Hoxsey 18, Losekamp 8. A dozen or more not voting.

The motion was then made to declare Mayar the unanimous choice of the meeting, which prevailed.

H. E. Carr, Chris Hansen, F. A. Losekamp, O. S. Sampson and Charles Anderson were then put in nomination for treasurer, the latter declining to have his name used. On the first ballot the vote stood Carr 19, Hansen 14, Losekamp 8, Sampson 13 and Anderson 1. The second vote was then taken and resulted in the selection of Mr. Carr, whose nomination was also made unanimous.

The following names were then placed before the meeting for councilmen, the five receiving the highest number of votes to be declared the choice of the meeting for councilmen: H. X. Featherstone, C. A. Sulenes, E. A. King, Christ Hansen, T. J. Coleman, Del McCoy, F. Martin, Dr. Hoxsey, John Bjork, H. H. Dean, F. A. Losekamp, S. C. Waldenberg, S. A. Williams and L. H. Turner. Messrs. G. S. Sampson, Charles Anderson and G. A. Daly were also named but declined.

Messrs. Featherstone, McCoy, Hoxsey, Coleman and Hansen were declared to be the choice of the meeting for councilmen.

A motion was then made that the ticket nominated be called the Citizens' ticket. This was unanimously adopted.

It was also moved and carried that the committee heretofore appointed, Deed H. Mayar, L. J. Nelson and C. B. Simmons, to prepare and present the petition for incorporation, on Monday, July 2, be continued, after which the meeting adjourned.
