Big Airship Feature at Spokane Fair

E. H. Hutchinson, of Spokane, returned home last week from a trip to St. Paul, where he attended the annual session of the Imperial Council Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. He stopped at Fargo where the North Dakota state fair was being held. He said that the airship which is to be at the interstate fair in Spokane was one of the marvels of their show. The airship sailed all over the fair grounds, following the race horses around the track, and after being propelled around for an hour lighted in front of the grandstand. The balloon then ascended and navigated further around the grounds for 30 minutes. It has a dynamo which operates a propeller in front of the balloon which is oval-shaped and 65 feet long. It is steered by a large canvas rudder. There were 15,000 people at the fair to see the flight of the airship.

NEWS ITEMS FROM SEATTLE

King County Has One or More Candidates For Every Office on The State Ticket

The peculations of R. F. Parkhurst, assistant cashier of the First National Bank, Seattle, extended over a long period of years and reached the total of \$48,000. It was one of those cases that makes a man stop and wonder if his neighbor is as honest as he thought he was. Parkhurst's record was so good that when the Bank changed hands he was the only official taken over by the new management and has always been looked upon as an exemplary man. For years he has fooled the most expert bank examiners and accountants. It does not appear that the proceeds of his thefts did him any particular good as he lived very quietly and had but little property to turn over to the bank when he was discovered. The knowledge all these years that sooner or later he would have to suffer for his crimes must have outweighed the temporary satisfaction he gained from handling money that was not his.

When two or more Seattle people get together their talk sooner or later turns to politics. Things are warming up at a great rate and so many people have taken advantage of the new primary law that every second man you meet is a candidate for some office or is managing some one who is. Gradually the big fights are centering in Seattle. King county where there are precincts that would wipe out the vote of some of the small counties, is now the battle ground, most of the candidates for state offices have finished their journeys throughout the state and have left King county for the last attacks. Governor Mead has opened headquarters in the Arlington Hotel where Cosgrove has been established for weeks. The P.-I. picks him to win while the Times is equally enthusiastic over the prospects of McBride. The Star, which is sticking to its rule of being entirely unprejudiced, places Cosgrove in the leading place. Certainly the Pomeroy man is gaining rapidly in this county and predictions that he will be the nominee for governor are freely made by local politicians. He has developed a strength in King County that is bewildering his opponents.

When the Pacific fleet sails away on its cruise to the South Pacific this fall it will carry among its stores 150,000 pounds of flour ground from wheat grown in eastern Washington. Uncle Sam, insisted, when he asked for bids, that the flour should be from home grown wheat.

The P-I has wakened up to the fact that King county is asking a great deal from the electors this fall. There are candidates in King county for almost everything in sight. Seattle is not as selfish as she is given credit for and the feeling that she is asking for too much will cost McBride a good many votes in the county.

ROADS IN NATIONAL FOREST

The Department of Agriculture will Co-Operate with the Forest Service

The office of public roads of the Department of Agriculture is to co-operate with the forest service in drawing up plans for comprehensive systems of roads and trails through national forests. For the last two years congress has appropriated funds for permanent improvements on national forests and a large part of the money thus made available has been and is being used for road and trail building. The amount is too small, however, in comparison with the total area of the forests, to make possible more than a very small beginning. With thicker settlement and increasing use of the forests good roads will become more and more a crying necessity.

The object of securing the help of the office of good roads is to make the work take the line that will not merely serve temporary convenience, but also count for most in the end. By building each year with reference to a carefully worked-out plan the danger of indirect effort will be escaped.

During the present summer an engineer of the office of roads will go over the ground on several of the forests and draw up plans which will be submitted to the forester, and will serve to guide subsequent work. In case where roads planned for cannot be built, trails will so far as possible be made to follow the courses laid out, with the expectation that they will be converted later into roads.

The roads, trails, telephone lines and fire lines already constructed on national forests are proving of great value both in the work of fire protection and in serving the convenience of the public. The further this work can be carried the greater will be the usefulness of the forests.

Announcement has just been made of the amounts which each state containing national forests will receive under the new law giving 25 per cent of the gross receipts from forests to these states. The total amount to go to the states from the receipts of the fiscal year, which ended June 30, is \$447,063.79.

Washington's part of this fund is \$18,032.79. The law requires that this money be expended upon public roads and schools by the counties which contain national forest land. In this way the counties are compensated for the reduction of taxable area occasioned by the existence of the forests. Before this year the states have received 10 per cent of the gross receipts, but congress voted last winter to increase the amount to 25 per cent.

THE ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE

Two State Conventions Held at Seattle and Spokane This Week

Lest there be undue quibbling with regard to the meaning of what "reasonable local option" is, the Anti-Saloon League called two state conventions of all the temperance forces of the state for the purpose of deciding upon the form of the local option bill which the people want presented to the next session of the legislature. These conventions were held at Spokane and Seattle on Tuesday and Wednesday respectively.

These meetings were held for the purpose of ascertaining just what the people of the state of Washington want in the way of temperance legislation. Each good government club, civic league, law and order society, or other organization looking to the betterment of moral conditions, were invited to send delegates. In this way it was anticipated that such a bill could be agreed upon as would best represent the wishes of those opposed to the liquor traffic. The exact drafting of the bill was left to a committee composed of men who have been interested in the passage of local option bills in the past and lawyers whose ability cannot be questioned. The conventions, however, determined upon the general features of the bill, such as the amount of territory to cover in the unit—whether the precinct, incorporated city, or the county, or all three. There are those who believe the temperance sentiment of the state demands a statewide bill, but this was left for future development.

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
