The tragedy has resulted in an agitation for Sunday closing in Edmonds and may result in driving out saloons altogether. There was no motive for the murder and the authorities believe it was just a plain case of a drunk and gun.

NEWS OF OUR STATE

College Grants Unsold. Olympia—E. W. Ross, Commissioner of Public Lands, has just furnished a statement to the State College of Washington, at Pullman, showing the total acreage of the lands remaining unsold, both in the Scientific and Agricultural College grants, also the amount of funds as shown by the records of the State Treasurer. Of the 90,000 acres granted for the support and maintenance of the Agricultural College, only 9275.49 acres have been sold since the grant was approved by the Department of the Interior, leaving a balance of 80,062.71 acres remaining in this grant approved and 561.80 acres yet to be selected. The permanent fund has bonds invested to the amount of \$113,600 which, on an average, draws 5 per cent interest annually. In addition to this, there has been turned into the state treasury \$1279.99 to the credit of the permanent fund and \$11,932.21 to the credit of the current fund. To this must be added 23 contracts of sale now in force, on which there is a balance due of \$53,583.84, which draws interest annually at the rate of 6 per cent. Of the scientific school grants, for which 100,000 acres was allowed, only 15,422.45 acres have been sold and that 19.07 acres remain yet to be selected.

Skin Grafted on Burns. Walla Walla—After more than a year of intense suffering, B. S. Powell, a traveling salesman, who was severely burned on his lower limbs by the explosion of a large lamp used for a footwarmer, while crossing the mountains of Malheur county, Oregon, in a stage, successfully underwent a skin-grafting operation in the Walla Walla Hospital last week. In all 12 pieces were taken from various parts of the man's body and placed on the injured portions of his limbs. Several physicians who have been in attendance on the case, conferred and agreed a skin-grafting operation was the thing that could save the patient's life. Powell is resting easier and is promised a complete recovery soon.
