

Passing of Horse-car Lines

PROFIT SHARING

How It Is Rapidly Progressing Throughout the Country

Recently the Westinghouse corporation announced that it was preparing a plan of profit-sharing for employees. Not long ago the First National bank of New York gave out information of its intention of putting into use an old-age pension.

Both systems have the same general purpose, that of giving workmen at some period of their lives part of the profits on the business which they have helped to make. The theory of economists used to be that profit-sharing had been proved unsuccessful by numerous attempts. Nevertheless experiments in it of one kind or another are continually being tried, and with new methods in use, it has every chance of growing. Today it doubtless has more beneficiaries than ever before.

Probably the largest arrangement of the kind in the world is conducted by the United States Steel Corporation, which regulates wages by the price obtained for its product. This system goes a long way toward redeeming it from the odium in which labor unions have held it for resisting their advances.

The Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company put into effect a meager pension plan, partly as an attempt to appease public sentiment before the last great car strike there. In New Jersey there is a newspaper which pays dividends on salaries, if the company prospers. Many railroads now have pension plans, notably the Pennsylvania. Last winter the Hocking Valley undertook for the first time the retirement of men in this way.

All of these plans, various though their details be, work out best for the individual employee. Length of service almost invariably is made a condition of sharing. The plans have a strong tendency to keep workmen from changing positions. Emphasis on the rewards of steadiness in employment has nowhere been more forcible than in the Pennsylvania railroad, where the rule of hiring no outsiders is seldom broken, and where all present officials have been in the company's employ from twenty to thirty-five years.

The old employee is the valuable one. Economy of time and energy are obtained by few changes. Men familiar with the work can increase the output. With an interest in the business, they will take notice of a thousand minute points of advantage to the employer which they would not otherwise regard. Moreover, with industry developing after ways made feasible by the great aggregations of capital, with trades multiplying and manufactures subdivided, and with immense corporations managed by a few men, what were more than just than an arrangement whereby every employe may become a part owner. - Columbus (O.) News.


