Violette, who will be associated with him in the enterprise, to have the place fixed up to suit his ideas of a swell joint in a small city. Where he expects to shine most fetchingly is in the preparation and serving of viands at meal time. He has given evidence of his skill on several occasions in getting up luncheons and suppers, which will be remembered. It is expected to have the place open to the public about October 15.
