

COUNCIL PUTS BAN ON PIGS AND COWS

No Family Can Keep More Than One Cow—Pigs are Banished Altogether

An ordinance prohibiting the keeping of swine in the city limits, and the limiting of one cow to any family, was passed at the regular meeting of the council on Tuesday evening.

The ordinance repealing ordinance No. 97, in regard to the opening of pool rooms on Sunday, was laid over until the next meeting, on account of one section relating to saloons which would have permitted them to open on Sunday.

All preparations have been made for the Cascade street improvement and the clerk was instructed to advertise for bids on the same.

The sewer system was brought up, and while every member of the council believed it was of vital importance, it would be too much of a burden for the taxpayer at this time.

The committee appointed by Mayor Carlquist to confer with Mr. Adams in regard to the purchase of his lot on the corner of 9th and Commercial street reported that they could come to no agreement.

Water Commissioner Robertson reported that some means would have to be adopted to notify the people in the city when the water would be shut off as it would take too long to notify every user.

Pinchot Criticizes Senator

Gifford Pinchot charged before the senate territories committee Tuesday that private interests had held up legislation to open Alaskan coal fields under a leasing system, and named former Senator Guggenheim of Colorado as one of the men who had exerted his influence to prevent such legislation.

"Do you mean that members of congress have been influenced by private interests against such legislation?" asked Senator Lippitt.

"I mean what you all know, that private interests have great influence in congress," returned Mr. Pinchot.

The former forester declared that in his judgement the government should operate railroads in Alaska. He believed in the leasing system for mines.

Mr. Pinchot advocated the retention in government possession of all "factors of power"—coal, oil and water power.

ORDINANCE NO. 119.

An Ordinance prohibiting the keeping of live stock within the corporate limits of the City of Leavenworth. The City Council of the City of Leavenworth do ordain as follows: Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons within the corporate limits of the City of Leavenworth to keep on any one lot within said corporate limits, more than one (1) cow, and no swine, to be kept, within the corporate limits of the City of Leavenworth, any swine.

ORDINANCE NO. 118

An Ordinance providing for the protection of animals in the Leavenworth Park. The City Council of the City of Leavenworth do ordain as follows: Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to in any manner interfere with or molest the animals or birds placed in the City Park, or to feed any of said animals without proper authority.
