John A. Vanasdien, one of the oldest citizens of Monroe, Wash., and mayor of that city, died at his home last Sunday morning. Mr. Vanasdien was the first postmaster of Monroe and opened the first business house there.

Judge Arthur of Seattle stopped off here Tuesday and spent the day with Chas. Smythe. On Wednesday morning the two gentlemen motored to Wenatchee in Mr. Smythe's car where the Judge will attend the State Bar Association which is meeting there this week.

Not one arrest was made in the city of Wenatchee last month and not one cent was collected in fines, which is a record, says Chief of Police Bartlett, of that city. The chief says that his men have been as watchful as ever but found no occasion for making an arrest in the past thirty days.

Every man who is looking for a job can find it now in the harvest fields in Eastern Washington. It is estimated that the harvesting of the big wheat crop will give employment to between 8,000 and 10,000 men and already the farmers are calling for help. The wages are said to be good.

W. E. Moore and Cameron Squires, of Wenatchee, well known here, commenced construction this week on a big dancing pavillion in that city. The pavillion, 50x120 feet, will be known as the Wenatchee Hippodrome. It will be an open air amusement hall with canvas sides and dome. Dances will be given every Saturday night and thru the week of the Fair Hesperides.

An excursion of Seattle business men bound for the upper Columbia river country will pass through this city next Monday and are expected to make a short stop here. The party, numbering about 100, hopes to extend Seattle trade into the newly opened country. On their return trip the excursionists will be banqueted at Wenatchee and given a ride thru the valley.

Okanogan, Wash., has deposited with the county treasurer of Okanogan county \$12,000 to be used by the county to defray the expenses of moving the county seat from Conconully to Okanogan, in the event the change is made, which will be decided at the November election. The citizens of that section are very much excited over the question of removing the county seat and much enmity has been aroused.

In Chelan last week W. A. Robison was found guilty of offering an insult to the national flag of the United States and fined \$1 and costs, the total amounting to \$30.70. He will appeal his case to the Superior court. Robison was arrested on the 4th of July for raising a large red flag on the shores of Lake Chelan, beneath which he placed a very diminutive American flag. The Citizens of Chelan became incensed and his arrest followed.

Wenatchee Water Users Refuse to Take Over Canal

In an election held in Wenatchee Tuesday the water users in nine out of the ten districts where water users voted on the formation of an irrigation district show 354 votes for and 392 against. The proposition is hopelessly lost. The law requires two-thirds favoring in order to establish the district. Sentiment is quite unanimous that in the near future an irrigation district will have to be formed in order to take over the high-line canal from the Wenatchee Canal company. The canal supplies water to 13,000 acres and the \$1.50 per acre maintenance fee will not pay the cost of maintaining the ditch. The company announces this is the last season it will guarantee to keep the canal in safe condition.

Water users realize the gravity of the situation and already there is much talk of immediately proceeding to hold another election.

Improving Telephone Line

Three crews of 15 men each are at work with modern equipment, with headquarters at Blewett, Cashmere and Leavenworth, on the \$68,000 telephone construction work between Wenatchee and Seattle. Last year the portion between Spokane and Waterville was completed, and between Seattle and Blewett. The \$68,000 appropriation is for the work between Waterville and Blewett. This is the biggest telephone construction job under way in the northwest and the crews are equipped with motor drills, motor pile driving apparatus and automobiles for the delivery and hoisting of poles.
