**ORDINANCE NO. 173**

An Ordinance providing a salary for Chief of Police and the Police Department of the City of Leavenworth and providing for the appointment of the Chief of Police and other police officers, fixing their compensation and repealing that part of Ordinance No. 160 in conflict with this Ordinance.

The City Council of the City of Leavenworth do ordain as follows:

First. The salary of the Chief of Police of the City of Leavenworth shall be \$90.00 per month.

Sec. 2. The salary or compensation of each additional member of the police force shall be \$75.00 per month if employed by the month and \$2.50 per day, if employed by the day.

Sec. 3. The Chief of Police shall be appointed by the Mayor and the term of office of said Chief of Police shall expire at the same time as that of the Mayor appointing him unless said officer be sooner removed by the Mayor by and with the consent of not less than four councilmen.

Sec. 4. In the event of an emergency the Mayor may appoint such additional policemen as may be required, to act from day to day as their services may be required and in the event additional police force should be authorized by the City Council, then the Mayor will appoint such policemen.

Sec. 5. All appointments of officers employed on a monthly salary shall be subject to confirmation by the City Council.

Sec. 6. That part of Ordinance No. 160 in conflict herewith is hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. The duties of the Chief of Police shall be as set forth in Chapter 184, Section 27, 1915 Session Laws of the State of Washington and such other duties as the Mayor and Council may from time to time impose by ordinance or resolution.

Sec. 8. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect when it shall have been passed by the City Council of the City of Leavenworth, approved and signed by the Mayor, attested by the Clerk, approved by the City Attorney; and from and after five days from the date of its publication once in the Leavenworth Echo, a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published within the City of Leavenworth, the same being the official newspaper of said city, and the Clerk is hereby authorized to cause the same to be so published.

First reading August 8th, 1916. Passed by the City Council this 22nd day of August, 1916.
