To the voters of Chelan county: A large number of the voters of Chelan county have urged S. O. Pool to become a candidate for re-election to the state legislature and since Mr. Pool has consented to accept the nomination, which was not sought by him, it is fitting and proper that the voters of Chelan county should become acquainted with his record in the last session of the legislature and with the reasons why he is urged to again become a candidate for re-election.

**Patriotic Legislation.**

Mr. Pool voted and worked for House Resolution No. 3, which was adopted on February 5, 1917, and by which the services and entire resources of the state of Washington were pledged to President Wilson in defense of the honor of our country. This was the first real war move in the state of Washington, and pledged this state to the support of the president, a pledge which has been and will be faithfully redeemed.

**Represents County on Appropriations**

Mr. Pool's efforts in the legislature secured to Chelan county the opportunity to raise Cavalry Troop "C", which later became headquarters troop on the battlefields of France. Not only Chelan county, but all North Central Washington, will, for years to come, be proud of Troop "C" and of the boys who have composed it.

Among other committees on which Mr. Pool was appointed and served during the last session of the legislature was the Appropriation committee. This committee is by far the most important committee in the house and has charge of the appropriation of all state funds. This is the only time in recent years that Chelan county has been represented on the Appropriation committee, and the fact that Mr. Pool held a place on that committee indicates the esteem with which he was held and the confidence which was placed in him by the leaders in the legislature. His position on the Appropriation committee resulted in a distribution of state funds which was fair to the people of Chelan county.

**Road Fund Doubled.**

Upon the distribution of state road funds, Mr. Pool secured to Chelan county more than twice the amount ever before appropriated to this county by any other legislature. More money has already been spent by the state in Chelan county from the appropriations secured by Mr. Pool than was ever appropriated by any legislature before, and a great deal of the appropriation is being held up by reason of the necessities of the war for use after the war is ended. The moneys expended have been used on the Lake Chelan-Okanogan highway, north of Lake Chelan, and upon the Blewett Pass highway.

**Interest Reduced on Delinquent Taxes**

Among the most important laws which Mr. Pool energetically supported and voted for was the Delinquent Tax Rate Law, which reduces the rate of interest on delinquent taxes from fifteen per cent per annum to twelve per cent per annum. This law, which was passed by the last legislature, reduced the interest rate, or penalty, required to be paid on delinquent taxes by three per cent, thereby making a saving of three per cent per annum to the property owner who is unable to pay his taxes promptly and cuts down to that extent the exorbitant income of the money lender who buys up delinquent tax certificates. This law has, and will, result in the saving of many dollars to the people of Chelan county.

Mr. Pool also worked and voted for the Water Code, the Bank Guarantee Law, the Bone-Dry Law, and actively supported other legislation beneficial to the state in general, and to Chelan county in particular. Citizens of Chelan county who had interests involved in the legislature found him at all times ready to be of real service as a representative.

**Not Controlled by Private Interests**

In matters of public policy in which Chelan county was interested, Mr. Pool has followed the dictates of his own best judgment and not the dictation of any person or group of individuals whose interests might conflict with the general welfare. Thru his support of the Pacific Northwest Publicity he has secured to Wenatchee and the Wenatchee valley a place on

**CIVIL WAR BUNGLING MUST BE AVOIDED.**

Turning to Woodrow Wilson's History of the American People, it is interesting to note the strong disapproval in dealing with the facts that the civil war ended without any apparent preparations for reconstruction. When the Confederacy surrendered Washington had no plans to meet the new conditions. President Johnson was evidently bent upon a program of generous treatment of the Southern people, but was met by a congress evidently determined to crack the lash over the naked backs of the vanquished. It took years to solve problems that should have been dispassionately discussed and determined before the surrender of the Confederacy. The people of the world have learned new lessons since 1865, and on this basis congress proposes to solve the questions ahead of it while the war is still going on.

And in the meeting of these problems the interests are bound to be so conflicting, and the ideas so various that the public is likely to wonder whether there is not a new war on hand. The fantastic dream of public ownership of all sorts of devices, running down the line to include many forms of manufacturing and agriculture, are already being suggested, and a good many ambitious politicians are going to enlist along those lines in the hope that they may ride on a new band wagon.

**A BLESSED FAILURE.**

Many months ago many newspapers of the country told the militant suffragists that they were making a fundamental mistake in picketing the white house, for the president has no constitutional voice in the submission

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of a constitutional amendment. Subsequent events showed the wisdom of the suggestion. The president was finally forced to go to the full length in trying to get the senate to vote in favor of the amendment, but his speech changed not a single vote. And it should not have changed a vote. He is not a dictator. He has no legal nor moral right to tell any man how to vote either in or out of congress. If the suffragists had succeeded in their effort, and had secured the submission of the amendment through the instrumentality of the president, a great injury would have been done to popular government. We would have seemingly established dictatorship over legislation and every one who wanted something from congress would go to the president for it, until congress would just gradually fall into the habit of getting its orders from the white house. While equal suffrage is fundamentally right, and will ultimately prevail, it was fortunate for the country and for the suffragists themselves that the president failed in his effort to cast the ballots of the senators. Of what value would it be to the women of the country to have a voice in electing senators and representatives who

count themselves mere rubber stamps to be used by the president as he sees fit? Of what value to the country would congress be if it were but an echo of the president? Of what value is a republican form of government if it is autocratic in fact? If the militant suffragists will think this over, they will themselves rejoice that they failed and that free government still lives.

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
