GOV. HART HAS PLAN.

OLYMPIA, April 22.—Governor Louis F. Hart is putting in all his spare time working out a practical plan for consolidating the more than two hundred State Board members and commissioners under five or six departmental heads. Governor Hart said:

"Upon the insistent demand of the people interested in some special line of activity, each session of the legislature adds from five to fifteen new boards and commissions, each created without regard to its relation to other departments of state government and without being attached to any specific department, until the state has become a hodgepodge of boards and commissions, one encroaching, if not entrenching, on the powers of one or more other boards and no two of them coordinating in their work.

"These several boards and commissions demand so much of the time of a Chief Executive that he has no opportunity to, in any manner, supervise the many large institutions which have been permitted to grow up in a haphazard way without any pretense at systematic operation or economical management until, through lack of business management the state government and its numerous institutions are costing unnecessary millions of dollars that had better be left in the pockets of the taxpayers.

"I am of the opinion that with a proper organization of administrative departments, a lessening of duplication of effort and with a full coordination, all working for the state, that these departments will not only be less expensive but that they will function to a far greater advantage; and, with a proper supervision of the penal, charitable and eleemosynary institutions of the state, they can be better managed with less than one-half their present cost."

Governor Hart appears to have some of those old-fashioned, practical notions and insists that the Chief Executive of a state bears the same relation to the state in its business affairs as would the president of some big business or manufacturing concern bear to the business activities of such a concern, and that his duty is to see that the state's business is run along proper economic lines. He added:

"No business concern could long exist if the time of its president were all taken up with the direct management of more than seventy departments working independently and at cross purposes."

Like the managing head of any other business concern, Hart thinks that as Governor he should devote his time to governmental policies and a general supervision of all the state's business while he holds each departmental head responsible for the work of his department.
