From Over the State**

April saw more building permits issued, representing a greater value and producing more fees to the building department of Wenatchee, than any previous month since the office was established in 1912. Permits were issued for buildings valued at \$72,000, making a total of \$175,400 worth of buildings.

Charles von Soehnen, aged 81, veteran of the civil war, 36 years a resident of Colfax and 20 years an employe at the Whitman county court-house, is dead. The deceased was a member of Lyons post, G. A. R., and had for 50 years been an active Odd Fellow.

Grant county farmers have launched a most interesting experiment. With a fund of \$6,000 secured by public subscriptions they have closed a contract with Charles M. Hatfield, of Los Angeles, to make rain. Compensation to the rain maker is to be paid for after results are secured. If six inches of precipitation is brought about over a 100 mile radius before June 10, the full amount is paid. It is stated that towers and other equipment will be employed to secure the desired results.

Manager of summer resorts, camp grounds, boat houses and amusement parks have organized the Inland Empire Association of Camps and Amusements recently. The object of the organization is the protection of resort managers and the improvement of the business, the building of good roads and the stocking of lakes with fish. A rapid growth of tourist travel to the lakes adjacent to Spokane is expected within the next five years and how best to care for this will receive the attention of the resort owners.

The financial statement of the city of Spokane for 1919 has been issued and shows assets of more than 25 millions with liabilities of almost nine millions.

**THE LIVING PROBLEM.**  
The derangement of money values throughout the world ought to be recognized as a natural consequence of the orgy of destruction which lasted from July, 1914, to November, 1918. How can mankind burn up, blow up, sink and otherwise destroy \$30,000,000,000 of property on land and \$8,000,000,000 on sea, and then kill or disable 9,000,000 producers of wealth and expect to escape a money derangement? There is a universal shortage of necessities and a universal oversupply of stuff called money. In many cases it is not money at all, but a ghost of what was money. The world is trying to use this stuff to procure necessities, and the more it is used the less it is worth.

So deeply is the desire for money implanted in the breast that hundreds of millions of individuals are eagerly reaching out for the imitation money, instead of providing an increase of the necessities that have become so valuable because of the mountainous bonfires of wealth consumed during the war.

The chase after money will not cease, and, accordingly, there will be an unnecessary prolongation of the universal distress, which might be shortened if individuals and governments would go earnestly to work producing necessities. The crater that represents the world's loss must be filled up by the world's productive energy before there will be an equilibrium. The individual and national unrest, irritability and misunderstanding are traceable to the confusion and distress caused by a shortage of materials of life, not of money.

As commodities increase in plente their values in money will decrease, at any rate in the United States; for American money is good money, backed by gold, and its relative value will rise as production increases. If any man wishes to see the money in his pocket worth more, let him work harder and produce more of something worth money. A miracle of restoration could be worked by Americans if they would unanimously quit extravagance and produce more of the necessities of life. They would find practically all of their troubles wiped away, including labor troubles.—Yakima Republic.
