## MARINE PLANE BRINGS AID TO DISABLED SUB-CHASER.

How Marine Corps aviators aided a disabled submarine chaser in the Caribbean Sea by delivering a spare motor part from their aviation supply base at Port au Prince, is told in an official letter received last week by Marine Corps Headquarters, from Major F. T. Evans of the Marine Flying Squadron in Haiti. The plan was one of the most novel yet recorded.

There are no passable roads from Port au Prince across the peninsula to Aux Cayes, where a few hundred yards off shore the disabled chaser lay, and no place where an airplane could land. It was decided to box up the spare motor part, attach the box and a 30-foot cable to an improvised floating buoy, and to drop the entire contrivance overboard close to the chaser where it could be picked up by the crew.

The plan worked successfully. The Marines made the 100-mile journey from Port au Prince, wig-wagged the chaser to stand by for a little 90-pound package, dropped it over the side of their airplane and returned to their station. The motor part was undamaged, and after the crew of the chaser had fished it out of the Caribbean and installed it in their vessel they continued their journey to Santo Domingo City.
