The Waterville Experiment Branch Station has the best stands of both winter and spring grains that it has had since establishment five years ago, showing striking results in tillage experiments. The same results have been obtained on adjoining farms which have followed the station's good tillage methods.

July 8, Supt. C. E. Hill of the station and Director E. C. Johnson of the experimental work in Washington will hold the annual demonstration day, when visitors will inspect all the crop work and tillage experiments. County Agent F. H. Zentner of Douglas County, and the Waterville Chamber of Commerce will cooperate in making this a day of note, and the Chamber of Commerce will serve a free lunch to all guests.
