IMPROVE SEED! SELECT PLOT NOW.

Purify Grain Seed by Destroying Weeds and Other Grain Varieties.

A week or two before harvest is the best time to select seed grain for next year, recommends Leonard Hegnauer, extension crop specialist of the State College. Look over the field of grain, if the variety meets your requirements, and pick out the portion which is best and make it the seed plot. Select a portion where the grain is most uniform.

After selecting the plot of grain, remove all weeds, plants of other crops and other varieties of the same grain. It is best to rogue the plot when all the grain plants are headed out. This is done to help produce pure seed, and remove chances of mixture.

It is undesirable to use a field for seed where the percentage of smut is high, but if such a field must be used,

the smutted plants should also be taken out. In good seed, not more than a mere trace of smut should be found.

After the seed plot has been cleaned of foreign material, it should be allowed to ripen thoroughly and harvested separately from the rest of the field. Great care should be taken to see that no mixing occurs while the various field operations are being conducted. Before threshing begins, clean the grain separator, as much mixing takes place when this is not thoroughly done.

The seed grain should be threshed in such a manner as to avoid seed injury because of cracking and breaking. Dry grain is subject to heavy seed injury where ordinary threshing is practiced. To prevent this injury the thrasher should be run at a lower rate of speed while threshing seed, than is customary when grain is threshed for the market. After threshing, the seed grain should be well recleaned and graded by a good fanning mill. If this is carefully done and the seed treated next year, there should be no danger from dockage and the seed should improve in purity from year to year.
