Every day the Northern Pacific trains bound west from St. Paul contain from 500 to 800 emigrants, going out to seek new homes. It is stated that a majority of them are bound for Oregon and Washington.

The O. R. & N. Co. has made a new loan of three million dollars, which will enable the Company to finish the road to connection with the Oregon Short Line this season, when the Union Pacific will have a through line to Portland.

Nearly 1000 men are now at work on the railroad from Corvallis to Yaquina Bay. Several miles of track are already laid, on the ocean end, and the work continues. A line of steamers will be put on to connect with San Francisco.

The *Oregonian* gives currency to a rumor that a gentleman lately returned from New York, where he spent some time in Wall street, says it is the belief now that the Central Pacific has secured a controlling interest in the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, and that it advanced some of the money for building the Oregon Pacific. Huntington is reported to have said recently that his company now controlled every Pacific coast railroad.

The latest concerning the presidential contest is from General Grant, being interviewed at Washington, said of the republican chances: "They were never better than now. Five months ago I believed the republicans were facing certain defeat. I did not think they had any chances, but the democrats have remedied that. The democratic party can always be relied upon in a case of emergency to give the republicans victory. The fight in the house over the tariff has made a doubtful election certain to the republicans."

Says a Walla Walla exchange: The great rush of immigrants for this country has now fairly commenced. Sixteen cars containing over 500 men, women and children arrived at Walla Junction Wednesday night, and three cars containing about 180 passengers came through to Walla Walla. The hotels are taxed to their utmost capacity to supply lodging, and at one caravansary over twenty immigrants slept in one room. Thursday morning four more cars well loaded with prospective settlers arrived from Wallula. The immigrants are apparently, in the main composed of thrifty Germans with money to buy farms, and the majority hail from Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois and Missouri.

The Portland *Telegram* says that in that city business men continue to be very greatly gratified over the improvement in business, which began about a fortnight since. Cheerfulness and confidence are noticeable on every hand. A new impetus seems to have been given all branches of trade. Sales are numerous and in most instances cash is paid immediately. A large amount of building is now under way, and a larger amount is contemplated, plans and specifications being in the hands of architects and contractors. The future looks much brighter than at any other time since the depreciation in Northern Pacific stocks. Immigrants continue to arrive, all of whom are bringing more or less money with them. This class of people will largely become producers and not consumers only. They will materially assist in building up the country.

Secretary Frelinghuysen, by direction of the president, has addressed a circular to all district attorneys and marshals of the United States, calling their attention to the reports, for which it is stated no proof has been adduced, and which the president can not believe, that "certain persons are aiding in perpetrating heinous crimes by shipping to foreign ports explosives dangerous in the highest degree to life and property. The honor of this nation," he says, "requires that it should not be open to imputation, unfounded though it be, of the slightest appearance of tolerating any such crime whatever, to be committed against our people or those of other countries." Attention is called to the statutes regulating the shipment of explosives, and the officers are instructed to prevent any offence against them, and to prosecute all who may commit such crimes. This is a proper course for the government to pursue. We are not at war with England, neither is Ireland. There is no rebellion to encourage, and as long as there is no war citizens of the United States should not be allowed to destroy property and life in England.

Clarke County Equal Rights Association.

The second meeting of the Clarke County Equal Rights Association will be held at Marsh's Hall, in Vancouver, on Thursday evening, April 10, for the purpose of increasing the number of members and electing additional officers. The association at the present time has about one hundred members, and is desirous of increasing the number of members to five hundred. The additional officers to be elected are two vice-presidents, a corresponding secretary, and an executive committee consisting of three persons. No pains will be spared to make the meeting interesting. A band of music will be in attendance, and interesting speeches may be expected from both ladies and gentlemen. All are invited to attend, and it is hoped that the friends of equal rights in Clarke county will not fail to be present.

GAME AND FISH LAWS.—It is unlawful to hunt, or kill between the first day of January and the 15th day of August, any deer, fawn, elk, moose or mountain goat; or between the first day of April and the 25th day of August, to hunt or kill any wild swans, mallard ducks, wood ducks, widgeon, teal, butterball, spoonbill, gray, black, sprigtail or canvas-back duck; or between the first day of January and the 15th day of August, any prairie chicken, sage hen, grouse, pheasant or partridge. Further, it is unlawful to have any of the aforesaid game in one's possession between the dates mentioned. It is unlawful during the months of November, December, January, February and March to catch or have in possession any mountain or brook trout, and it is forbidden at any time to catch the same except with hook and line. It is unlawful to shoot at or kill any duck between hours of 8 P. M. and 5 A. M. Violation of the provisions of this act are punishable by a fine of from \$10 to \$300, one-half to be paid to informers and the other half to the prosecuting attorney.

GIONINNI'S CASE AGAIN.—The *Dayton Chronicle* says that Father Cesari has just returned from Olympia, where he has been to see the Governor in the interest of the condemned murderer Gioninni. Father Cesari says that he knows Gioninni is innocent of the crime for which he is convicted, but to prove such he must first prove who the guilty party is, and this he cannot do as a priest. What a strange position Father Cesari must occupy. The inference from above would be that Gioninni was innocent, and that the reverend father had become so convinced through the confession of another.
