Our Foreign Trade.

The loading here of the E. K. Wood, the Annie Larsen and the Catharine Sudden and Sailor Boy, means more than the usual shipment of a cargo of lumber to San Francisco. All of these vessels will load foreign; all of them are bound for Talara bay, Peru, consigned to W. J. Grace & Co. This firm, of which Ex-Mayor Grace, of New York, is the head, owns extensive petroleum fields in the country back from Talara bay; a country destitute of timber, and is compelled to look elsewhere for the large quantities required in operating their fields. This trade has come to Aberdeen as the natural lumber port on the Pacific coast. For the first South American lumber fleet, 2,130,000 feet, the combined capacity of these vessels is not a bad showing.

As soon as the politicians get time from the rigors of election to appoint the deputy collector of customs and establish a sub-port of entry as required by law, we will have a right to expect a much greater impetus to our foreign trade, a trade that will prove of benefit to the logger and mill men alike. It is only because of the foreign trade that Puget Sound mill men are able to pay two dollars more for logs than the Grays Harbor logger gets.
