A Red Siwash Intrigue.

Last Friday was brought to Hoquiam and incarcerated in the strong box of the city jail a siwash gentleman known as Mr. Otook, or "Big Head." He stood accused of having pumped a plug of lead into a fellow siwash with a deadly intent—John Clip, by name.

Otook appeared before Justice Warren on Tuesday and was bound over to appear before the supreme court at its next session.—Washingtonian.
