



SIMPLY FACTS.

Prosecuting Attorney or Attorney for the Chinamen?

Were the editor of the HERALD not one of the parties charged by Geo. J. Moody in the felonious crime of burglary, he would not hesitate to express with whatever force he might command his opinion regarding Mr. Moody's actions in the premises. As matters stand, he feels constrained to simply state the facts of the case, and leave it to the public to determine whether or not Geo. J. Moody has sufficient of his capacity of prosecuting attorney for Chehalis county in his great for the Chinamen. Whether or not Moody has been as considerate of the good name of these citizens of Chehalis county, who previous to the charge of stealing from a Chinaman brought against them by him, had never had the steepest aspersion cast upon their honor, as he has been of keeping one John Wing, a Chinaman, free from that power law that he has been so ready to take against those whose skins were so yellow.

The facts are these: On the night of the 7th of November the Chinamen in Aberdeen were compelled by persons unknown to leave the city, and were taken to Montesano and left on the wharf there. John Wing, the head Chinaman, stated in a newspaper reporter that he recognized among those who had compelled him to leave, and who, he stated, robbed him of \$550, Capt. S. C. Mitchell, John Jones and F. R. Wall. This statement, based simply upon the word of a Chinaman, was published throughout the United States, having been copied by the papers from the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, where it was first published. This statement was first published on the 11th, and on the 12th the persons named in the superior court an affidavit against John Wing with libel, and named unimpeachable witnesses, by whom, had the prosecuting attorney so red, he might have satisfied himself as to the entire innocence of the persons charged. Instead, he did not put his finger over to examine any evidence available, except such as was furnished by John Wing.

The law required Geo. J. Moody to file information against John Wing, based on these affidavits. This he did not do until compelled by the court, on the 11th of November. Before being compelled, he, in open court plead that John Wing might be protected by the court, and said that he had no hesitancy in saying that the affidavits were, in his opinion, nothing more than a malicious conspiracy to intimidate this poor Chinaman. This statement was deliberately made when the whole field of evidence was open to prove its falsity, had he been to enter it. He said that should the court decide that he must file these affidavits, still he had not been guilty of negligence in not having done so, as he had been too much taken up with other public business, and that his not doing so was working no hardship in any one. We state it as indisputable facts that he found time to make affidavits, file informations, and have issued warrants for the arrest of six citizens of Aberdeen, although he could not find time to file three informations upon the affidavits of three of those citizens. In his working no hardship, in his eyes, that these citizens were resting under the charge of stealing money, and were using every endeavor possible to get him to perform a purely ministerial duty in order that they might at once bring the matter before the superior court, and without a moment's delay show their innocence. These are facts, everyone of them, and from them the public and the people of Chehalis county may draw their own conclusions.

The City Dads.

The city council met in regular session last Wednesday evening. Present, Aldermen Anstie, Koehler, West, Young, Absent, Mayor Maling, Aldermen Kellogg and Babcock. Councilman Anstie was elected mayor pro tem.

On motion the regular order of business was dispensed with.

The minutes of meetings of November 6th, 12th and 13th were read and approved.

The following bills were presented: F. Miller, planking 1000 feet Market street, \$1345; referred to street commissioner.

D. R. Jones, recording deed, \$1.25; paid.

Petition from J. P. Guthrie for a sidewalk on Second street from B street to Grant street was presented and granted.

Petition from Alex McMillan and others, praying for filling Wishkah street from L to Washington streets, was granted.

Petition of H. K. Drake and others for an electric light at the intersection of K and Wishkah streets, tabled.

Ordered that a sidewalk be constructed on north side of First street from B street to Chicago avenue.

Petition from Pioneer Hose Co. No. 1 read and ordered filed.

Moved and carried that the mayor pro tem appoint a committee of one to have plans drafted for a city hall and hose tower.

Sealed bids for the planking of Market street were then taken up. They were as follows: Ed. Newman, \$1.32 per foot; R. S. Jackson, \$1.29; A. J. T. Smith, \$1.22 1/2; John Sanders & Co., \$1.55; O. L. Crane, \$1.29. On motion the contract was awarded to A. J. T. Smith, on his filing a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$1700.

The council then took up the bids for the improvement of B street, and a contract was awarded to Ed. Newman at the following rates: Planking sixty feet wide including sidewalk, \$4.35 per foot; earthwork filling, 15 cents per yard. He must file good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$2950.

Moved and carried that a contract be awarded to R. S. Jackson for filling and grading B street from Market to Second street at 95 cents per foot.

The following bids were received for planking Heron street from Alder to Washington; John Sanders & Co., \$4.65; A. J. T. Smith, \$3.72 1/2; R. S. Jackson, \$3.29; Woodward & Cummings, \$3.43; E. Newman, \$4.00; N. H. Van Wart, \$3.59. Ordered that the bid of R. S. Jackson be accepted, and contract be awarded to him on filing good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$2400.

After the transaction of some further routine business the council adjourned to meet Wednesday evening, November 26, 1890.

The schooner Premier is loading lumber at the West mill.

The American Girl has discharged her cargo and will load lumber for San Francisco.

It is reported that the Montesano will soon be laid up for repairs. Her run will probably be taken by the Chehalis.

The San Buenaventura came in tow of the Traveler Tuesday and is loading at Wilson's mill for San Francisco.

The tug Traveler brought in a schooner Tuesday en route for Cosmopolis, where she is now discharging.

The schooner Norway has finished discharging ballast, and will load lumber for San Francisco.

The J. M. Weatherwax returned from her maiden trip last week, loaded with a general cargo for this port. She is loading lumber at the Weatherwax mill.

The steam schooner Socia arrived in the harbor Friday with a cargo of hay for the Grays Harbor Commercial Company. She is now loading for below at Cosmopolis.

The steamer Point Loma arrived Tuesday on her regular trip bringing a large consignment of merchandise to our dealers. She will load lumber for her return trip departing Saturday for San Francisco. The steamer Favorite is being thor-

oughly overhauled. She has a new deck and new upper works entire, and when finished will be an exceedingly trim little craft. She expects to resume her run in the course of a week.

The new boat Chehalis was in this port several hours Saturday, and was inspected by a number of our citizens. Much speculation is rife as to the speed merits of this boat and the Typhoon. The two flyers will have to settle the matter by a race.

Son of the head of the school of art at Lahore, Rudyard Kipling was born at Bombay, December 30, 1865, and is therefore still quite a young man. He was educated in England, but returned early to India, where he soon began to contribute articles, tales and verses to the journals, such pieces becoming part of his subsequent regular newspaper work. In 1880, Mr. Kipling returned to England, paying a long visit to America, on his way thither.

His little pieces by which he has won his fame are most of them mere sketches—realistic pictures—but they suffice to exemplify the variety of his powers and feeling.
