## Political Phenomena During the Year 1891.

Principal phenomena predicted for 1891 are four eclipses, two of the moon, a transit of over the sun's disk, and the disappearance of Saturn's these the last two will excite interest.

Eclipse of the moon, May 23, visible in the United States, but generally throughout the western Pacific ocean, Australia, Asia, and Europe.

through the plane of Saturn's ring. The rings then, in telescopes of sufficient power to show them, will appear as a fine straight thread of light. From September 22 to October 30 the earth will be above the plane of the rings, while the sun will be below that plane, shining upon the south side of the rings. The rings then should entirely disappear, except the very fine thread of light which comes from the outer edges of rings A and B. After October 30 the sun will be on the north side of the plane of the rings, so that its light will illuminate the same side of the rings at which we look. Many interesting observations were made at the time of the disappearance of Saturn's rings in 1878, and, although the position of the planet will be very unfavorable, it is to be hoped that many of them will be repeated this year, and accurate data obtained for the solution of the problems connected with the rings. Saturn will be in conjunction with the sun on September 12, so that at the time of the disappearance of the rings it will be very close to the sun and can be observed only very near the horizon.—Sideral Messenger.

EDITOR HERALD: Will you bring to the attention of the people of Aberdeen, through the columns of your valuable paper, the fact that more than one-half of them are living in open defiance of an important ordinance of this city? The law allows a man twenty-four hours to get his wood under shelter, after it is scattered at his door. It is safe to say that half of the wood consumed by the householders is never under cover until it is put into the kitchen oven to dry out, preparatory to being burned.

There are wood-piles in this city that have so long occupied certain fixed positions that they have become landmarks and, like the cruse of the biblical widow, they waste not, neither do they fail. The result of this slovenly laxity is that our streets present the appearance of a Kansas town the day after a cyclone. Wind'ng its way through this dishevelled lumber-heap runs a tortuous road, just wide enough to allow a skillful driver to get his cart through.

The people of this place have grown so accustomed to the eye-sore that they can hardly estimate how much this unkept neglect detracts from the appearance of Aberdeen, nor what a thriftless Chinook business it seems to the new-comer.
