## HE PROPHESED GREAT THINGS

An Old Poem About Columbus and the West Discovered.

There has come to light a singular World's Fair prophecy. The prophet is Joel M. Barlow, a Massachusetts poet, who, 100 years ago, immortalized in epic verse the story of Columbus and his voyages. The poem was entitled "A Vision of Columbus."

This poem is singularly interesting in view of the preparations now in progress for the celebration of the Columbian Quadri-Centennial. Whether by accident or instinct the poet succeeded in clothing his verses with the mantle of prophecy, vague in many places, but descriptive to a remarkable degree of the progress of the then unknown west and more particularly to the tribute to be paid to Columbus in 1892. Here are a few lines:

I sing the mariner who first unfurled An Eastern banner o'er a Western World, And taught mankind where future empire lay, In those fair confines of descending day.

The misfortunes of the discoverer are portrayed—how the ingratitude of his country bowed him down—and then he is made to apostrophize the land toward which his soul had ever yearned:

Land of delights; ah! dear, delusive coast, To those fond aged eyes forever lost; No more thy flowery vales I travel o'er, For me thy mountains rear the head no more, For me thy rocks no sparkling gem unfold, Nor streams luxuriant wear their paths in gold.

From realms of promised peace forever borne, I hale mute anguish and in secret mourn. The following lines have the ring of prophecy. It looks as though the poet had foreseen the great honors which would be heaped upon Columbus' name by Chicago, or rather America:

In this dark age, tho' blinded faction sways, And wealth and conquest gain the palm of praise, Awed into slaves while groveling millions groan, And blood-stained steps lead upward to a throne.

For other wreaths thy virtuous temples twine, For nobler triumphs crown a life like thine; Thine be the joys that minds immortal grace, As thine the deeds that bless a kindred race.

Now raise their sorrowed soul to views more bright, The visioned ages rushing on thy sight; Worlds beyond worlds shall bring to light their stores, Time, science, nature bidnd their utmost powers

To show concentrated in one blaze of fame, The undying glories that await thy name. The poem is full of prophetic pictures, and is further enriched by graphic descriptions of the war of independence, in which the poet took an active part.—Chicago Tribune.

## CHEHALIS COUNTY CURRENCY.

He will also build a section house, tool house, tank and pump house at once.

Last Wednesday evening Peter Smith, a Northern Pacific railroad employe, was badly injured by the cars. The accident occurred near the depot. The unfortunate man's arm was fractured near the shoulder and the bone was so badly splintered that it protruded from the flesh on the under part of the arm. Dr. Parent was called to attend the injured man, and started soon after the wound was dressed to take him to the railroad hospital at Tacoma, but upon arriving at Centralia, he found it necessary to amputate the member, and assisted by Drs. Baker and Boetwick, the operation was performed.—Elma Chronicle.

## RAILROAD TO THE RIVER.

Northern Pacific Through Train to Tacoma Monday.

Monday morning the steamer Montesano bore in large letters "Northern Pacific Through Trains" to Tacoma; Tickets on Board." The Montesano failed to make connection with the train at Montesano, but now she leaves here at 6:30 a. m., connecting with the train at Montesano, which leaves for Tacoma at 8 a. m., reaching Tacoma at 11:30 a. m. Returning, leaves Tacoma at 12:30 p. m., reaching Aberdeen at 6 p. m. For the present, there will be only one train a day; but as soon as the road is completed to Aberdeen it is expected two round trips will be made daily.

This is only another step nearer the outside world. It is only a question of a short time when the road will be running into Aberdeen.
