GENERAL NEWS.

Six thousand acres are planted in potatoes on Whidby island.

Captain R. W. Simpson, the millionaire lumber dealer, died at San Francisco on the 19th inst.

Rudyard Kipling, the celebrated Indian novelist, arrived in New York, June 18th. He is very weak from lung trouble.

General John M. Scofield, commander-in-chief of the U. S. army, was married to Miss Georgia Kilburns, of Keokuk, Iowa, June 18th.

A receiver has been appointed for the Fidelity Fire Insurance Company of Huron, S. D. The investigation by the state auditor showed that the liabilities exceeded the assets by \$25,000. All policies will be turned over to the Hecla company of St. Paul, which will assume all risks.

In accordance with the findings of the court of inquiry in the case of the lynching of Gambler Hunt by U. S. soldiers at Fort Walla Walla, the secretary of war has ordered the court martial to try Col. Compton, of the Fourth cavalry, for negligence in failing to take proper steps for the prevention of the lynching.
