THE CITY COUNCIL

MARSHAL ANSTIE ASKS THAT OFFICER DOYLE BE REMOVED.

Doyle Demands Investigation of Charges Against Him, and Wants the Marshal Investigated. Heron Street Plank Not on Grade. Steam Schooners Ask for Fire Apparatus. Bills Allowed, Etc.

At the council meeting last evening, Marshal Anstie sprang a sensation by requesting the removal of Officer Doyle from the police force. The marshal preferred no specific charges against Doyle, but intimated that he had them up his sleeve. Doyle was present, and demanded an investigation, not only of the alleged charges against him, but of the official conduct of the marshal as well, and suggested that the investigation be made at an open meeting of the council. In view of Doyle's remarks, Marshal Anstie demanded that his office be investigated, but the demand was ignored, and the matter of the removal of Doyle was referred to the police committee, and no action whatever was taken as to the marshal's office.

The resignation of Police Officer Murphy was read and accepted. Under the new law, the mayor has the appointing power, and Mayor West appointed W. B. Fetterman to fill the vacancy. The attorney was directed to prepare an ordinance for the replanking of the alley in block 45.

The contract for building sidewalks on Front street, between C and D, South Aberdeen, was awarded to Ed. Hulbert for 50 cents per foot.

A communication from the Pollard Steamship Co., suggesting that at the city equip the steam schooners running in here with fire apparatus, was read and filed.

Manager Finch, of the Grays Harbor Electric Co., exhibited a profile of the streets, prepared by the engineer of the company, which showed the planking on Heron street to be below grade. Supt. Semmens was directed to attend to the matter as the company cut the planking to drive piles.

The report of the police judge was referred to the finance committee.

Marshal Anstie requested the council to employ Attorney Hogan to assist the city attorney in defending him in the damage suits brought by Peter Holpa. City Attorney Fox said he had no objection to having the assistance of Mr. Hogan, but said the city should incur no such expense, as he felt perfectly capable of handling the cases alone. The matter was referred to the police committee.

Supt. Semmens was directed to have the hose houses painted.
