A. C. Everett, recently appointed to the office of county fruit inspector passed the examination before the state inspector last Saturday.

John C. Biles has resumed hauling logs at his camp on the South side, near Montesano, after a shut-down of two weeks, during which time he was building an extension of his railway.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Baker came down from Centralia last Saturday on a visit to friends in this city.

Guy Marcy, who has been attending Washon college, returned to his home in this city, last Saturday.

Dr. E. C. Storey left Tuesday for Coos Bay, Oregon, to be gone perhaps a month on a combined business and pleasure trip.

Dr. F. L. Carr accompanied by his friend Dr. Salisbury, left last Friday for Oregon to look over timber lands in that state.

J. E. Calder has purchased the house in rear of bowling alley and will move it to his lots at the corner of D and Second streets, a block west of the Vidette office. J. E. Calder this week sold R. M. Ryland's place east of town to Martin Beasly, a recent arrival from Minnesota. The price was \$1,500 for 40 acres.

Died, Saturday morning, June 13, Louise, the 16 months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Erickson of this city. The body was taken to Olympia for burial, Rev. Swain of that city conducting the services Sunday.

ELMA
An adjourned meeting of the new school board of Elma was held in the office of the school building on Monday evening to transact business left over from Thursday evening's regular meeting.

The board has been organized for the year by electing Dr. H. M. Blair as chairman and E. S. Avey, the director, as clerk.

Teachers, for the ensuing year were elected. Three of last year's teachers, who have already taught four years in Elma, were re-employed at an increase in salary of about 12 per cent. Professor Watten will again be principal at \$65 per month. This is equal to the salary paid to city superintendent of the Centralia schools. Professor Brewer will teach the fifth and sixth grades, and Miss Clay will teach the primary department, taught last year by Miss Hartley, of Tacoma, who has accepted a position in the Olympia schools.

The following new teachers were employed at a salary of \$55 per month: Miss Georgia Powell, of Montesano, to teach the second and third grades, and

Miss Abbie Kellogg, who taught in the Seattle schools last year, to teach the fourth grade. The seventh grade remains unfilled. For it a salary of \$55 will be paid.

The year just closed has been one of the most successful in the history of the schools here. Eighty per cent of the eighth grade pupils received state diplomas. The attendance was 12 per cent higher than previous years. One-seventh of the regular attendants were neither tardy nor absent during the entire year. Two pupils have been neither tardy nor absent for three entire years.

HOQUIAM.
Hoquiam is to have another splendid hospital. Arrangements are completed, and bids for the construction of the building will be called in a few days.
