THE CITY COUNCIL

COUNCILMEN HAVE NO SINCERE SINCE THE FIRE.

Plenty of Work for Them, and New Problems Bumping Up Every Minute. They Are Met Promptly, and Managed Judiciously. Several Meetings of the Board.

Whatever may have been the shortcomings of the city council in the past, that body has risen to the emergency occasioned by the fire in a manner most commendable. Their prompt action, in preventing the rebuilding of a shanty town, is now appreciated, even by some who were most opposed to the fire limit ordinance at the time of its passage.

A meeting was held Monday evening at the office of Mayor West, and passed an ordinance creating the office of inspector of buildings, and fixing the salary of same.

A. G. Long, of Portland, appeared, and explained several things about the steam fire engine, and offered to loan the city a fire bell until a fire house was erected.

A resolution was adopted giving the mayor, marshal, and Councilmen Sherwood, Morgan and Fuher control of the erection of temporary frame buildings.

The city attorney was allowed the services of a stenographer during the present rush in his office.

The resignation of Policeman Roberts was accepted, and M. E. Bergusont was appointed to fill the vacancy temporarily.

The clerk was authorized to discover the proper kind of coal for the fire engine and purchase a supply.

It was decided to grant no new saloon licenses for the present, and the application of Peters & Jackson for a transfer of their license to Wishkah street was held over to the regular meeting.

A number of permits were granted for the erection of temporary building in the burned district.

The council met last evening in the first regular session since the fire, and ratified the proceedings of the four special meetings.

An ordinance, designating the second floor of the West & Slade office building as the city hall, was passed and approved.

The ordinance granting the N. P. Ry. Co. the right to lay a spur track to the Union mill was passed and approved.

Attorney Fox gave his opinion that the council could not create the office of building inspector, and suggested that the officer be called the city engineer, and a resolution creating that office, defining its duties, and fixing the salary at \$100 a month, was passed and approved.

Marshal Anstie reported he had appointed T. W. Murphy, T. H. Hill and C. F. Jensen, without salary, to serve when wanted. The appointments were confirmed.

An ordinance creating the office of street superintendent, and defining his duties, and fixing the salary at \$100 a month, was passed and approved.

Boves & Thompson were authorized to conduct a saloon at their new location.

A saloon and theater license was refused to Bert Chauncy, at No. 10 Hume street, under the resolution to grant no new saloon licenses. The theater license being referred to the committee.

Attorney Shields offered a resolution directing the clerk to issue no licenses to variety shows for the present. After amending it to cover all licenses, without consent of council, it was adopted.

Peters & Jackson asked to transfer their license to 38 Wishkah street. The petition was denied.

D. J. Heffron had his saloon license transferred to the temporary building on the corner of G and Heron street.

E. B. Benn called attention to the Salvation Army, which had secured new quarters, and was trying to speculate on a permit to build on their old location, and the permit was revoked.

A petition, asking that the building of temporary structures by others than those burned out, in the fire limits, be prohibited, was referred to the committee with power to act.

A petition for a sidewalk on the west side of Hume street between Michigan avenue and Washington street, was granted, and the attorney was directed to prepare a resolution accordingly.

The water committee reported the meter out of order at the brewery, and a new meter was ordered.

Attorney Fox reported against allowing claim of John A. Mitchell for \$1000 damages, and it was disallowed.

The petition for arc lights was refused.

Sherwood called attention to an item in the Bulletin, blaming the council for a shortage of hose, and Chief Koehler denied having made such statements. Reporter Irvine and Koehler swapped a few words over the matter, and were called down by the mayor.

The clerk was directed to advertise for bids for the improvement of B and Cleveland streets.

A fireman was employed to assist at the pumping station, and Chief Engineer Bowen was raised \$10 a month, and the clerk was authorized to order supplies needed at the station.

Chas. Pottle and J. J. Green applied for the position at the water works. Owen Hainer was appointed.

The matter of failure to shut off water at the fire was referred to the fire committee.

The resignation of Supt. Semmen was accepted, to take effect upon the appointment of his successor.

An ordinance creating fire limits, and regulating the construction of buildings, framed after the Seattle ordinance, was passed and approved, and the mayor was authorized to have a number of extra copies printed for general use.

The mayor and clerk were authorized to purchase 1000 feet of fire hose.

S. Shyrook was awarded the contract to build sidewalks on Hume street, for 62 cents per lineal foot.

The fire limits committee was authorized to provide a place to keep the fire apparatus.

The street committee was instructed to examine the city dock, and report on its condition.

Miss Minnie Jones was at her land claim when the fire occurred, and walked 19 miles Monday to reach home, when she heard the news.

The school board will probably sell the lots on Wishkah street and build a new school building in the growing northwestern part of the city.

O. C. Mitchell, a son of Capt. S. C. Mitchell now living in California, has sent \$10 to the fire department, to help the boys in their loss by the fire.

Thos. Morgan has purchased two lots of Geo. Loehr, on the corner of Heron & K streets, for \$3,000 and will probably erect a large hotel on the property.

Chas. Drake found the charters of the Woodmen of the World, and the Rathbone Sisters during the fire, and left them at the residence of Marshal Anstie.

State Senator O'Donnell was down from Elma last evening, with a view of purchasing a dynamo from the Aberdeen Electric Co. for use in the White Star mill.

A subscription paper was circulated Tuesday by the chamber of commerce for the relief of distress cases occasioned by the fire, and was met in a liberal spirit.

Miss Elizabeth O'Reagan, aged 32 years, died Tuesday morning at St. Joseph's hospital, of consumption. The remains will be shipped east for interment.

The Salvation Army has purchased the property of Chas. Pinckney, on F street between Wishkah and Market, for \$1,700, where they will establish headquarters.

The Baptist Young People's Union will give a social tomorrow evening, at the home of Mrs. A. J. Grant. Each lady is requested to bring a basket, with lunch for two.

The insurance men met yesterday and agreed to place no insurance on the temporary buildings now being erected under permits, and to charge 8 per cent for insurance on their contents.

N. G. Kaufman sold his lot on the corner of Heron and G streets, to W. B. Mack, Chas. L. Lewis and Ed. Hulbert for \$15,000, and R. J. Hiltz, as agent, claims to have sold it to another party, and threatens a law suit to enforce his sale.

The Y. M. C. A. finds itself in the usual position of any concern that makes provision only for expenditures. A debt of \$1,500, with but \$600 in promises to meet it with, betrays such a lack of business methods as will result in more injury to the institution than the mere fact of the debt.
