Mince Turnovers. Make a biscuit dough with twice the usual amount of shortening. Roll thin and cut in circles the size of a large coffee saucer. Have any kind of meat or fowl chopped finely, moistened with a little catsup and seasoned well. A very little gravy will also be an addition. Put a spoonful of the meat on one-half of each of the circles, wet the edges with cold water and press together. Brush the turnovers with beaten egg and bake in a quick oven.

Lemon Jumbles. Cream together one scant cupful of granulated sugar and one-half cupful of butter; add one egg, well beaten, and three teaspoonfuls of milk; sift three teaspoonfuls of baking powder in two cupfuls of flour and stir them into the above mixture; flavor with lemon and add the juice of half a lemon; add enough more flour to make stiff enough to roll out; sprinkle with granulated sugar after they have been cut into rounds; press the sugar in a little and bake in a slow oven, in order that the jumbles can bake but not brown.
