About 250 people were present at the piano recital given by Prof. B. R. Shryock, in the Congregational church, Tuesday evening. The program made a happy impression and will no doubt gain pupils by this method of advertising his work.  
Mr. and Mrs. John Berthoff arrived Monday night from their wedding trip, and are at home to their friends after this week. While away they visited many of the Eastern cities and stayed some time with Mr. Berthoff's parents in New York.  
This morning the Ideal dry goods store in the Rowland-Anderson block, was opened for business. S. P. Lunt, the proprietor, has been careful in selecting his stock, and intends to leave nothing undone in catering to the taste of the Aberdeen trade.  
Among the visitors in Aberdeen yesterday, was R. R. Reed, noted as being the first man who took eggs and newspapers into Dawson. In 1898 he took thirty-six dozen of the hen fruit into that section, and sold them for \$1.50 per egg. The papers he sold for \$2.50 and \$3.00 each.  
The receipts of the Aberdeen postoffice are still increasing. The increase during the fiscal year ending June 30, was 18.6 per cent. over last year. As a consequence the salary of Cecil T. Bell has been raised to \$800, and that of Miss Ella Fox to \$700; each an increase of \$100 over last year.  
C. L. Werk is visiting the harbor towns with a view of making investments in this section. Aberdeen seems to please him more than any other part. Workmen on the Pearson Bros. building on H street have finished the foundation, and are now at work setting up the frames for the concrete of the superstructure. Instead of running moulds in shallow boxes, as was done on the Commercial block, frames the full height of the building are being placed, and boxes put inside of those.  
The committees appointed by the Masonic fraternity to look into the matter of building a temple, met yesterday afternoon, and decided to ask the secretary of the corporation to call a meeting of the temporary board, for the purpose of taking steps toward the immediate erecting of the Masonic temple. This meeting will probably be held tomorrow.  
The case of N. G. Kaufman vs. Capt. Norager was tried in the superior court Monday. As questions of facts were not at issue, Judge Irwin took the case from the jury and decided the Norager lease to part of the Kaufman lot, at Heron and G streets be vacated; Norager given twenty days to vacate the premises, and for Kaufman to pay costs of suit. This leaves this valuable corner in position for its new owners, W. B. Mack, Ed. Hulbert and C. L. Lewis, to erect a brick block, which will doubtless be commenced shortly.

### THE CITY COUNCIL

#### WILL ERECT NEW BUILDINGS AT PUMPING STATION.

All Temporary Buildings Ordered Removed in Sixty Days, Several Street Improvement Contracts Let. May Compromise Crawford's Suit Over B Street Grade, Etc.

The matter of temporary buildings erected after the fire, occupied a greater part of the time of the council last night, and that body appears disposed to regard the minor store keepers—those whose business will not justify paying the rents asked for brick buildings—with scant consideration. Sherwood called up the matter by calling attention to the fact that Mr. Elftland was still occupying a frame building at F and Wishkah streets, although there was a vacant building to be had just across F street. This set the ball rolling, and I. W. Mason, E. L. Koehler and J. B. Elston complained that the Olympia restaurant was delaying the erection of two brick buildings, for which Messrs. Koehler and Elston were now ready to drive ailing. Mr. Willey was ordered to move the building in five days. J. B. Dabney complained of the building of Grabrielson & Holmer, saying that firm intended to continue in it until next year, and that it was a menace to the brick block being erected by him on the corner of H and Heron streets, and increased his insurance rates. Finally an order was issued requiring the removal of all temporary buildings within 60 days. As this sweeping order will include the city building used as fire headquarters, as well as a number of small dealers, it will necessitate some lively moving in the next two months.

A request of Dunn, Cole & Dunn, that grades be established on certain streets covered by the sewer system, was referred to the street committee.

Mrs. Alex. McMillan protested against what she believed to be a proposed improvement of Ash street. The clerk was directed to inform the lady that no such improvement was contemplated.

Reed & Briggs reported that new buildings would be required at the pumping station. Referred to the water committee, with power to act.

On recommendation of the committee, no charge is to be made for the sprinkler system of Wilson Bros. & Co., in consideration of that firm putting in a large pump which will pump into the city mains in times of fire.

The water committee was authorized to fence in the necessary part of the water works.

The report of Treasurer Locke, showing the following cash on hand: Current expense fund, \$2,657.72; water fund, \$26.63; interest on bonds, \$16,561.11; state tax, \$1,040.00; total, \$22,771.67. Referred to finance committee.

The requests of J. M. Vashbinder, Fred Van Est, E. C. Thompson, C. E. Walsh, Ed. T. Nelson, M. Ingebrightsen, J. J. Carney, John Lindberg, T. E. Elliott and J. S. Creech for permission to build sidewalks in front of their property on Market street; J. B. Dabney and E. L. Koehler, to improve alley in block 42; West & Slade and Wilson Bros. & Co. to do their own improvements on East Aberdeen streets, were granted.

A remonstrance, containing 21 names, against selling the city lot on G street, was read and filed, but no action was taken on it, as the council probably thought it a pretty popular move if but 21 objectors could be found.

The request of S. W. Johnson for a street crossing at Hume and M streets was referred to the street committee.

The mix-up of a lunch wagon license was referred to Marshal Carter for untangling.

A proposed agreement with the N. P. R'y Co., relating to right of way in South Aberdeen, was referred to the street committee.

The attorney for Chas. Wappenstein, who won his damage case against the city yesterday, suggested that the judgment would be waived if the grade of F street was altered to please him. Referred to street committee with power to act. The same committee was authorized to see what sort of compromise could be effected with H. D. Crawford concerning the B street grade.

The Capital saloon license was transferred to the new building erected by John O'Hare.

The attorney was directed to prepare an ordinance for sidewalks on G street, and planking alley in block 42.

The following contracts were awarded: Sidewalks on H street, and planking alley in block 41, to H. Schouwiler, at 41 cents for sidewalks and \$1.29 per linear foot for planking alley. For 16-foot plank road on B street, South Aberdeen, to R. S. Jackson for \$1.09 per foot. Planking 16-foot roads on East Aberdeen streets, to John Anderson, at \$1.10 per foot. Anderson and Schouwiler were tied on their bids for this work.

Assessment roll of special improvement district No. 107 was equalized.

The fire committee was authorized to purchase coke for the steam fire engine. The following bills were allowed: Harbor Dock Co., freight, \$11.59 N. P. Express Co., express, 8.05
