THE CITY COUNCIL.

Holds a Very Brief Session Last Night. Routine Business.

The meeting of the city council last night did not last much more than a half hour, yet all business on the calendar was attended to.

In the absence of Mayor West, J. J. Garney was elected mayor pro tem, and Councilmen Jones and Morgan were absent.

The attorney was directed to prepare resolutions for the grading of North N street, between Sixth and Eighth, and for a 20-foot plank roadway on Third street between G and F.

A communication from the Bricklayers and Mason's Unions asking that inasmuch as 12-inch concrete walls were permitted by the building ordinance, it was unfair to insist upon 16 inch brick walls in like buildings. The letter went into the relative merits of brick and concrete at some length, and was placed on file.

The attorney was directed to have the best house property stricken from the county assessment rolls.

The clerk was instructed to rebate all taxes whenever satisfactory proof of payment was made, the former order only permitting the issuance of a warrant upon presentation of a receipt for the tax.

A petition for a sewer on East Wishkah street between Fairfield and Benn, and Benn street between Wishkah street and the Chehalis river was referred to the street committee.

Saloon licenses were renewed for L. W. Walker and Vidler Bros.

The report of the treasurer for August, showing balance on hand, \$13,614.22, was referred to the finance committee.

The attorney was directed to prepare an ordinance for the improvement of Curtis street between Clark and Evans.

Along the Water Front

Mrs. A. E. Flowers arrived yesterday from Everett, and will open the Grays Harbor Business College in the Dabney block, next Monday morning. Mrs. Flowers will have charge of the shorthand department, and Prof. Bennett, who will arrive tomorrow, will be in care of the commercial department. About 25 pupils have already signed to enter, and a number of others are preparing to do so.

Invitations are out for a church wedding, to take place at the Congregational church, on the 28th of this month. The contracting parties are Miss Maud McDermoth, second daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Charles McDermoth, of this city, and Mr. Chas. H. Alburty. The Rev. Scudder, Jr., General Missionary of the Congregational church for the Northwest, will perform the ceremony. A reception will be given at the home of the bride's parents immediately after the ceremony.

BOYS TOO YOUNG

To be Held for Rape, and Will Probably Escape Punishment.

In the case of the four boys arrested last week for assaulting a five year old girl, with criminal intent, the case came up for trial Tuesday in Justice Pearson's court.

After hearing the evidence, the court ruled that under the law—the boys being under the legal age—they could not be held for rape or attempt to commit rape; but that they could be tried for assault and battery, and it being the opinion of the court that it had jurisdiction in the case sufficient to give adequate punishment, the case was set for yesterday morning. When the case was called the prosecuting attorney made a motion that the case be dismissed on the grounds that the justice court did not have jurisdiction in the case, as it could not give adequate punishment; the justice court being limited to 33 days in jail and \$100 fine as punishment. The court allowed the motion, and the boys were discharged without date, although the previous day it had ruled directly opposite to that motion.

As to what action will be taken further in the matter remains to be seen. The actions of the judge and prosecuting attorney indicate that the evidence showed the child to have been assaulted, and that the boys complained of were the guilty parties.
