FAREWELL SONG RECITAL.

Aberdeen Enjoys a Musical Treat by the Misses Baker and Merzbach.

The farewell song recital given by Miss Suzanne Baker, on Thursday evening in the firemen's hall, called out the musically inclined public, both in this place and Hoquiam.

Miss Baker was ably assisted by Mrs. W. H. Hull and Miss Hull, pianists; Mrs. L. H. Brewer, reader; and Miss Merzbach, violinist. The gathering was a representative one and there was a large number of critical hearers who were more than satisfied with the recital.
