AND THIS IS FAME

A PARIS CORRESPONDENT TELLS OF M. LE COLONEL BRYAN.

A French Paper Prints An Amusing Story of the Great Commoner in Evident Good Faith. A French Conception of American Politics.

Not long ago there appeared in a paper published in the south of France an amusing account of the life and exploits of Col. Bryan that no doubt this gentleman fully enjoyed.

The story was written by the Paris correspondent of a country paper. It is based, so the writer says, on information he got from friends of Mr. Bryan who are prominent in Paris.

A western war filled the Frenchman with startling information, and how he must have smiled when there appeared the following in cold print:

"M. le Colonel Bryan first came into fame as one of the strange, half-savage band of cowboys who roamed over the Far West, fighting the Indians and wild beasts. Imitating, perhaps, the custom of the Indian chiefs, each of the cowboys bore a nickname based on some of his exploits as a hunter and fighter. Thus M. le Colonel Bryan's title among his rough, but brave and sturdy comrades was Silver Bill the Dead Shot. After the treaty of peace was signed with the Indians at Chicago in 1896, Col. Bryan went out of the cattle business and became one of the bonanza farmers of the West. He can now sit on his back stoop, as the rear veranda is called in America, and look over his fields of corn stretching further than the eye can reach in every direction. As a result of his early training on the plains, where he spent months at a time without an opportunity of talking to another human being, the former candidate for president is exceedingly taciturn and can hardly be persuaded to express his opinion on the issues of a campaign. He is the author of a book of adventure called "The First Battle," in which some of his encounters with the Indians of the Tammany and other tribes are described at length.

In the effort to partially neutralize the strength of M. le Colonel among the cowboys and Indians who make up the largest part of the voting population west of the Alleghany mountains, the Republicans have M. le Roosevelt for president. M. le Roosevelt is one of the leading cowboys of America and is especially famous for once having vanquished a grizzly bear in single combat. During the last campaign M. le Colonel Roosevelt has ridden a series of horses all over the country, giving exhibitions of rough riding such as were seen in Paris a year or more ago under the direction of another American statesman.—American Philippine Review.

THE CITY ELECTIONS

Result in a Division of the Offices Among the Three Tickets. Lindstrom Is Mayor.

Election Very Close. Lindstrom's Majority but 10. Taggart Elected Attorney by 12 Votes Over Abel. Roy Sargent Makes a Phenominal Run. Ward Returns.

Considering the deep interest in the elections, the city was very quiet Tuesday. Everybody interested was busy rustling for their respective favorites from early morning until the close of the polls. As usual, the result contained a number of surprises, the unexpected happening with several candidates.

Lindstrom's victory, even with his small majority, is a tribute to his own personality, and the rustling abilities of the push that stood behind him. The defeat of Townsend was not unexpected, even by many of his supporters, who realized his slight acquaintance in the city as a serious handicap. Notwithstanding his two years' residence in Aberdeen, Mr. Townsend's acquaintance is not large. He is a very busy business man, whose entire time since he has lived here has been occupied with his personal affairs, so that his views upon the many complex questions arising in municipal affairs were comparatively unknown.

The election of Taggart was one of the surprises, even to himself and friends, and "Bob" will be compelled to hustle to maintain the legal reputation attributed to him Tuesday by his enthusiastic friends. The large majority of Roy C. Sargent dazed even the winner, and was wholly unlooked for. Both candidates are young men, reared largely in Aber-

deen, and almost everybody expected a close contest.

Owing to the narrow majorities of some candidates, one or more contests are probable. In this connection, the vote of the fourth ward appears to be the bone of contention, several irregularities being alleged in counting the vote.

But one ward councilman on the Citizens ticket was elected, W. W. Hart, from the third ward, the Independent Citizens candidates being successful in the fourth, fifth and sixth wards. For health officer, Dr. Paul Smith passed under the wire with the narrow majority of seven votes. Taken as a whole, there is good reason to expect a good administration from the city government as now constituted for the coming year.


