## BUILDING A CITY HERE

### The Detailed Building Record of Aberdeen for the Year 1904.

#### Nearly Four Hundred Thousand Dollars Expended in Aberdeen in Building Operations in the Past Year. Including Municipal Improvements it Will Exceed That Sum. A Magnificent Showing.

That the city of Aberdeen has passed the experimental stage is evidenced by the large amount of building done here in the past year, and the fact that the greater part of the new structures are of such construction as would be creditable in any city, gives it an air of permanency and stability that at once impresses a stranger with the fact that there must be resources behind such a city.

The total sum expended in building operations during 1904, as shown by the records of the office of city engineer, is \$354,854.00, the detailed record of which is printed below:
