LUMBERMEN CONFER

MATTERS OF 1905 REPORTED SHOW GOOD RESULTS.

Mills From All Over the State and B. C. Represented. Everett C. Griggs Succeeds Himself as President of the Lumbermen's Association. Plans Laid for Next Year.

Lumbermen from various points in Western Washington gathered at the Tacoma hotel Wednesday to attend the annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association, at which there was a good attendance.

The principal business before the meeting was the annual election of officers. Everett C. Griggs, second vice president and general manager of the St. Paul & Tacoma Lumber company, who has held the office of president for two terms, was nominated by George H. Emerson, of the North Western Lumber company of Hoquiam, and the election was unanimously made by acclamation, leaving Mr. Griggs nothing to do but to accept.

Annual reports were presented briefly by the chairmen of the different committees. R. H. Alexander, of Vancouver, B. C., chairman of the cargo branch, reported general good trade conditions, inspection of cargoes at the mills increasing and promises for 1906 in the foreign market good.

Secretary Beckman stated that reports received from thirty mills showed that they had on their hands orders for 3,615 cars of lumber.

D. W. Bass, of Seattle, president of the shingle mills' bureau, reported that 252 straight shingle mills were closed and 47 not closed. This is 92 per cent of the whole cut closed. Other mills would close, Mr. Bass said, but had not yet signed up.

Secretary Beckman stated that the output during 1905 will show a marked increase as compared with 1904, and that the membership today represents actually about 2,000,000,000 feet. A conservative estimate of rail shipments, he said, places the increase this year at 40 per cent. over 1904, and the cargo trade increase at 25 per cent. Incomplete returns for the eleven months of 1905, he said, show the cargo movement to be 1,025,000,000 feet, or more than the entire shipment for 1904. The association membership has an aggregate daily output of 7,500,000 feet.

There are now 259 shingle mills and 60 saw mills shut down, stated Mr. Beckman, representing a curtailment in the output of 900,000,000 shingles and 80,000,000 feet of lumber.

The cargo inspection bureau issued certificates during the eleven months for 299,713,980 feet of lumber, 6,622,551 lath and 1,501,330 pickets, according to the secretary's report. The receipts for this inspection were \$8,074.16 and expenses \$7,654.24. The secretary has handled in the eleven months of 1905 a total of \$23,611.54.

MRS. GERTRUDE BORDEN DEAD.

Wife of Richard H. Borden Passed Away at 6 p. m. Thursday.

Mrs. Gertrude Borden, wife of R. H. Borden, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred H. Nye, died Thursday evening at 6 o'clock, after several weeks of serious illness.

The funeral services were held at the home of her parents, No. 112 East First street, at 2 p. m. Saturday, Revs. L. L. Cloyd, of the Baptist church, and C. McDermoth, of the Congregational church, officiating. The services were simple and appropriate, Mrs. S. M. Anderson rendering a vocal solo during the service.

Mrs. Borden was born in Worcester, Mass., and has been a resident of Aberdeen fifteen years. She was united in marriage to Mr. Borden October 4, 1895, one daughter, Dorothy, now seven years of age, being the issue of that union. In youth she joined the Congregational church, but on coming to Aberdeen she transferred her membership to the Baptist church, being a member of that communion at the time of her death. In addition to her husband and daughter, her father and mother and brother, George F. Nye, are left to mourn her untimely death.

Mrs. Borden was a member of Wishkah Circle No. 127, Women of Woodcraft, a large number of whom were present at the funeral, and their tribute of flowers showed the high esteem in which she was held by them.

MOVE COUNTY SEAT

HOQUIAM PLACES MATTER UP TO ABERDEEN YESTERDAY.

Commercial Bodies of Two Cities Hold Meetings. At Hoquiam Yesterday Afternoon It Was Decided to Accept the Propositions of Aberdeen.

The Aberdeen chamber of commerce and the commercial club of Hoquiam have taken up the matter of the removal of the county seat from Montesano to Grays Harbor in a manner that indicates business.

It has all along been recognized that to carry the election by the required three-fifths vote it was necessary for Aberdeen and Hoquiam to get together, and further to furnish a site for the court house and not less than \$10,000 to help build it. At a meeting of the Hoquiam Commercial Club Thursday night, a committee of the Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce was present, and on behalf of Aberdeen made the following proposition: Aberdeen would furnish two blocks of land, within 1,000 feet of the Hoquiam city line, and \$10,000, title to the land and the money to be placed in escrow before the election. Some Hoquiamites thought \$15,000 should be put up, and the Aberdeen men suggested that they would come home and consult the people and give Hoquiam an answer on that proposition the next afternoon.

Friday afternoon, a Hoquiam delegation came up and met with the Aberdeen committee and other prominent citizens in the city council chamber. The Aberdeen committee said they believed that to furnish the site and \$10,000 was all the city cared to do, and suggested that if Hoquiam would furnish the site and \$15,000 and locate the court house within 1,000 feet of Aberdeen, this city would pitch in and help them get it.

The Hoquiam committee then returned home to submit this proposition to their people, and a mass meeting was held yesterday afternoon in that city to consider the matter. At this meeting the whole subject was gone into thoroughly, with the result that it was decided to get in and help place the court house in Aberdeen, within 1,000 feet of the Hoquiam line, provided Aberdeen would furnish the two blocks of land, deeded to the county, and raise \$10,000.

This puts the matter up to Aberdeen, and President Bowes has called special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce at the city council chamber this evening to determine the matter. It is very desirable that a full attendance be at this meeting tonight, in order whatever action be taken will be after mature deliberation, and be assured of the support of the city.
