NEW CITY COUNCIL

HOLDS A VERY LIVELY AND BUSY SESSION LAST NIGHT.

Chief Schneider Still Holds His Position, There Being no New Appointment. All of the Other Officers Are Reappointed. North Aberdeen Bridge to be Inspected.

All of the councilmen were present when Mayor France called to order last evening, and when the minutes were approved Councilman Sherwood moved that the regular order of business be set aside and that the mayor announce the appointments. This had a bad effect upon Councilman Mapes, and before the motion could be seconded he was on his feet and claimed recognition. In the meantime Mr. Hood seconded the motion, which Mapes claimed was out of order, but the mayor, seeing only dilatory tactics, proceeded to hear the motion. Mr. Mapes appealed to the council, upon which the mayor, who did not seem to be in a fighting humor, said "All right, go ahead, let the council decide." The council evidently did not wish to listen, so the appeal was withdrawn, and the mayor proceeded with his announcements. Then the fun began.
"For chief of police, Edward Payette," said the mayor. "I move for a secret ballot on confirmation," said Mr. Sherwood. Then there was much talk, but the vote carried, and Mr. Payette was rejected by a vote of 5 to 7.
"I move that the council suggest by secret ballot to the mayor their choice for a chief," said Mr. Sherwood, and again there was much talk. Some wanted it understood that they were there to support the mayor in his appointments, and others wanted to go down into history along the same line, but again Mr. Sherwood won, and the secret ballot stood 10 for Adam Schneider, 1 for George C. Dean and 1 for William Anstie, Mr. Payette not being mentioned. The mayor announced that the police department would remain as it was until the council could find a man that all could agree upon. This ended the squabble.
The following appointments were then confirmed:
Water Superintendent—S. B. Linn, Sanitary Inspector—C. E. Morse, City Engineer—H. W. Troutman, Library Trustees—F. A. Hart, J. C. Hogan, William Irvine, Mesdames J. Douglas and W. B. Mack.
No changes were made in the fire department or at the pumping station.
Under routine business, the bonds of the city clerk, police judge and attorney were filed, and the judiciary committee was requested to fix the amount of the bonds for the other officers and report at the next meeting.
The attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance giving the street commissioner authority to keep the streets and alleys clear of obstructions.
The owners of the north half of block 35, original plat, asked that it be eliminated from the fire district. Referred.
On recommendation of the street superintendent, the bridge committee was instructed to examine into the safety of the North Aberdeen bridge, and report at next meeting.


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
