WANT WATER WORKS

MAKE CITY OFFER OF \$150,000 FOR WATER SYSTEM.

Another Attempt to Alienate Water Works From City. A Similar Effort Was Defeated Four Years Ago. Influences Been Quietly at Work Ever Since.

J. M. Clapp, of Seattle, made the city council an offer last Monday night to purchase the water system for \$150,000, he and associates to receive a franchise to operate it for a term of years.

SECRETARY TAFT

IS MOST CORDIALLY WELCOMED IN ABERDEEN YESTERDAY.

Young Men's Republican Club Prove Themselves Great Hosts. The Secretary and Party Lunched at the Washington. Theater Packed to Hear Distinguished Citizen.

The Young Men's club deserve credit for conceiving the idea and so handsomely carrying it out, of inviting Secretary of War W. H. Taft to visit Aberdeen.

The secretary, accompanied by Senator Piles, John L. Wilson, Congressman Cushman, Secretary Yandell, of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, Major Chittenden, Edward Gill, and Louis H. Burnett were met at Olympia by Percy J. Perry, on behalf of the club, and escorted to the city.

A large crowd met the party at the depot, where automobiles were in waiting to convey them to Hotel Washington, where a sumptuous lunch was spread.

At 2:30 the party were taken to the Grand Theater in autos, where every seat from pit to dome was filled, and the standing room crowded.

Secretary Taft was introduced to the audience by Judge Lanning, president of the Young Men's Republican club, and Judge Taft began his address with the statement that he had heard on the sound that whatever Aberdeen undertook it done well, and that his experience confirmed the opinion.

The speaker avoided politics, and delivered a most interesting address, filled with real Americanism without a tinge of party bias.

Of the first two he gave a resume of the legislation fostered by President Roosevelt, and said he favored imprisonment instead of fines for the offending magnates.

On the subject of the Philippines, a subject with which his experience in those islands has made him very familiar, his talk was somewhat in the nature of an excuse for having held the islands, and was the same old argument that has done duty since the colossal mistake in statesmanship of the Nineteenth century was made.

His description of the natives was vivid and entertaining, and the statement that seven out of eight million inhabitants were Christians no doubt surprised many of his hearers.

After his address was concluded Senator Piles arose and, in a neat speech, presented the secretary with a gold souvenir spoon, provided by Louis H. Burnett, which bore the portrait of George Washington, and the inscription, "Aberdeen, Sept. 11, A Thirty-foot Channel to the Sea."

TO IMPROVE STREETS

CITY COUNCIL IN SPECIAL SESSION ON STREET MATTERS.

Residents of Hill District Attend in Force, and Oppose Plans Outlined by the Council as too Expensive. Will Grade Broadway, Eighth and H Streets.

The special meeting of the city council held Monday night to consider suggestions by those interested as to the method to be followed in improving the streets of the hill district, was attended by a representative body of property owners interested.

It was shown in the meeting that there was a strong probability that beds of gravel would be discovered in some of the streets that require heavy excavations, which might be used to good advantage, or that cement gravel could be obtained from near Cosmopolis for one-half the cost of washed gravel called for by the ordinance, and the consensus of opinion favored grading the streets, and placing plank curbs at the park strips for the present.

An apparent fear that the owners on streets with light grade might have to pay for those where the cutting or filling was heavier, had the effect of preventing the adoption of the cheapest plan for the improvement, by having the grading done in one district, thus making a contract large enough to justify the use of modern appliances in moving the earth.
