TO IMPROVE STREETS COUNCIL PROVIDES FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO COST \$19,000. Broadway and Second Street Are Omitted From Schedule. Fire Engine Out of Commission. Would Go to Wynoochee for Water. Bluff Road Contract Let. The city council broke the record in the way of street improvements last night in adopting six resolutions, providing for improvements aggregating \$19,000. The following streets are included: Clearing, grading and grubbing Fifth street between N and Broadway, estimated cost \$4,800. Grading and grubbing, retaining walls and storm water outlets on Sixth street between Broadway and I, estimated cost \$500. H street from Market to Eighth, and Eighth from H to Broadway, same as Sixth street, estimated cost \$6,000. A 20-foot roadway on Jefferson avenue between Second and Blaine; on Blaine from Jefferson to M, and on M from Blaine to alley in Blks. 4 and 5, Bayview Add., estimated cost \$3,700. A 20-foot roadway on River street between H and I, on north side, estimated cost \$1,000. A 20-foot roadway on Market street from Division to N. P. tracks, estimated cost \$3,040. October 2 was fixed to hear protests on all these improvements. J. M. Clapp offered \$150,000 for the water system, which was promptly tabled. The offer was accompanied by an iron clad franchise for 50 years, fixing upon the present high rates, and leaving the amount of fire hydrant rental for future agreement—which means we would have a water company in city politics up to its neck every year. A street light was ordered at Olympia and First streets. Supt. Hiltz was directed to build foot bridges, and alter stairway to High school, as requested by the school board. Despite the protest of Councilman Shelley, the bill of Mrs. Hamilton, for plating in South Aberdeen, was rejected. Complaint was made that I. B. Callison might be contemplating an obstruction to the sidewalk in East Aberdeen. U. G. Kinnison was allowed \$24, for pasturage. Shorrock & Co. declined to stand the reduction made in their bill for expediting the books, of \$266 50, and offered to stand \$50, but wanted the balance. Referred to attorney. A claim of John Church, for lumber, was referred back for information. J. B. Haynes petitioned for the plating of the alley in Bk. 50, and the extension of a spur track on River street. Referred to committee. H. Grandall asked pay for a boat lost by the street department. Referred to finance committee. A request to lease a portion of Heron street by the G. H. Box Co., was referred to the street committee. A protest was filed by the N. P. Ry. Co. against its property being included in the filed in district. Ed. P. Nelson was awarded the contract for plating the trestle on the bluff road, at 85 cents per lineal foot. Chief Graham reported the fire engine in need of new tubes. Referred to the fire committee. A protest, largely signed by business men, was read and filed, against granting any more telephone franchises. An ordinance was read granting a telephone franchise for 25 years to nobody in particular, and giving the whole 25 years to erect the line—or sell the privilege. Taken as a whole, it looks like a mighty good franchise to trade on. Referred to the judiciary committee. Councilman Jones suggested that water be brought from the Wynoochee river at an estimated cost of \$120,000, and, figuring that as \$150,000 was offered for the plant (with a 50-year franchise attached), Aberdeen could consider it an asset to that amount, and so could issue bonds for the new system. The matter was referred to a special committee, of Ingram, Pinckney, Shelley and Mapee.

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
