The damages asked for was \$10,000, and the case will in all probability be appealed. CARNegie MONEY READY. Work on Aberdeen's Public Library Library Building Will be Pushed. Rev. Chas. McDermoth, secretary of the board of library trustees, received a letter Monday from the library representative of Andrew Carnegie, in New York, saying the appropriation of \$15,000 made in December, 1906, by Mr. Carnegie was still available, and was ready in sums of \$2,000 or \$3,000 as the work progresses, upon receipt of the architect's estimate of material delivered and work done, countersigned by the secretary of the board of trustees. The trustees have decided to purchase the lot adjoining the library site on Market street, which is held at \$3,000, giving grounds 100x130 feet, the intention being to face the structure on Market street instead of I, fill the lots and make a little park. About \$500 that was in the city treasury for use of the library, through the salary donations of Mayor France and ex-Councilman Hood, has been turned over to the board, and the balance will be secured by private subscription. The piling and part of the material for concrete is on the ground for the foundations, and the American Contracting Co. is preparing to rush the building through to completion. It is said that Boss Clark has removed the interdiction he placed on the building last year, and that he will now permit union men to work on it without objection, so that the rapid erection of the institution may confidently be looked for. KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS. Local Lodge Preparing to Entertain District Convention. Wishkah Lodge No. 44, Knights of Pythias, is just perfecting arrangements for the entertainment of its visitors during the convention of the district, which meets in this city on March 6. The district comprises the counties of Chehalis, Pierce, Thurston, Lewis, Mason and Pacific, and is participated in by thirteen lodges. Prizes will be awarded for degree work, and for proficiency in individual and official chairs, and several lodges will attend with full teams, so that about two hundred Knights will be in attendance. STEAMER LINDSLAY ARRIVES. Aberdeen Steamship Makes Voyage From the Great Lakes. The steamer A. G. Lindsay, owned by the Rupert Steamship company, arrived Monday afternoon from San Francisco, ending a voyage of many thousands of miles on a trip from Cleveland, Ohio, to Grays Harbor. The Lindsay was a lake steamer and was purchased by the Rupert company early last year, after the company had been organized in this city. The Lindsay brought coal from Ohio to San Francisco and came here in ballast. Her crew was discharged at San Francisco, and Captain Kelley, formerly of the steamer Alliance, running between San Francisco and Portland, brought the Lindsay here. The Lindsay has a capacity of 2,000,000 feet of lumber and is designed like all the Great Lake vessels. She is a coal burner of 678 tons register and left Baltimore August 5. While waiting a charter the Lindsay will go on the marine ways for a general overhauling.
