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THE CITY COUNCIL

CHEW THE USUAL WEEKLY RAG LAST NIGHT.

Who is Boss of City Farm on Charley Creek is Decided in Favor of McDougal. Improvement of Business Streets is Lost Sight of Apparently.

The only enjoyment of the monotony of the city council meeting last night was caused by the report of Supt. McDougal recommending that Mr. Sebring, who lives on the city farm at the Charley creek water works be discharged for inattention to his duties, and—worse than all—for speaking disrespectfully of the city officials.

Street Commissioner Hiltz objected to the report, and claimed the man was in his department and was perfectly satisfactory, but the council considered McDougal in the right and fired Sebring.

Weatherwax, chairman of the special committee on the revocation of the Cub saloon license, was granted further time in which to report. A discussion was had in this matter over an application of one of the partners in this saloon asking to have the firm license transferred to his partner, who, said Dolan, would conduct the place according to law. The committee was given further time.

City Engineer Ewart made a report on the proposed improvement of Market street, giving the estimated cost of various methods of improving that thoroughfare. The council adopted his recommendation as to have the street filled and drained, and the old plank replaced for a few years, when it should be paved.

After discussing the matter at length, it was decided to adopt the Star system of fire alarm boxes, the Star people agreeing to replace all the Gamewell boxes now in use at their expense.

A communication from Representative Phil S. Locke, with reference to some changes in the second class city laws now proposed in the legislature, was referred to the judiciary committee.

The city engineer was directed to arrange with the Northern Pacific Railway Co. for the diking of lands in the western section of the city.

A claim of W. J. Woods for damages to his buggy by reason of a defective street was referred to the attorney.

An ordinance was passed for building a sidewalk on Jefferson street.

The contract for the improvement of King street was awarded to A. B. Guisen for 87 1/2 cents per lineal foot.
