**TRANSACT THE WEEKLY BUDGET OF BUSINESS LAST NIGHT.**

**Bealey Bath House to Operate. Old Assessment of F Street is No Good. State Sanitary Inspector Compliments Aberdeen. Another Chemical Fire Engine Ordered.**

Attorney Agnew addressed the city council last evening, in behalf of the creditors of Chas. Bealey's bath house and bootblack stand, and was given permission to operate the same, after certain alterations and improvements were made, to lessen the danger of fire.

Attorney Wade reported that the cost of opening Second street would come from the current expense fund.

The claim of R. T. Dabney, for \$305 damages by reason of being delayed in the repair of his Wishkah street building, was rejected.

The matter of enforcing the F street assessment against Ross Pinckney was dropped, on the advice of the attorney.

A bill of St. Joseph's hospital, for care of a pauper, was allowed.

A petition of Creech & Walker, for a spur track was referred to the judiciary and street committees.

The protest of Jacob Hummery, against paying delinquent taxes was referred to the attorney.

A bill of C. V. Loy, for photo negatives furnished, was referred.

Plans were ordered drawn for a fire station in South Aberdeen, to cost not more than \$3,500.

The plumbing bill of S. B. Davis was reduced from \$760 to \$662, and allowed.

State Sanitary Inspector Coombs addressed the council on the subject of sanitation, and said that he and Mayor Benn found 83 open receptacles for refuse in the alleys of four blocks, and called attention to other unsanitary conditions existing.

He complimented Aberdeen for having the most complete sewer system in the state, and said this city was making more public improvements than any city of like size in the state.

A resolution was adopted regulating the disposal of garbage, by the city, and fixing monthly charges for its removal, ranging from 25 cents for residences to \$4.00.

Councilman Crivvea was granted a leave of absence for three weeks.

The matter of leasing the alley in the rear of the furniture factory was laid over a week.

An ordinance was passed requiring hotels and lodging houses to maintain fire escapes.

An ordinance was passed providing for the dyking of the west end of the city, from Division street to the west boundary line, at an estimated cost of \$3,500.

An ordinance establishing grades on River, Hume, Heron, Market and First street, between K and Division streets, was passed.

Plans were adopted for Sewer District E, and an ordinance ordered drawn for its construction.

An ordinance was ordered for the improvement of Lafayette and Laura streets.

A new chemical engine was ordered of A. G. Long, for \$1,800.

Tirquist & Soderstrom were awarded the contract for the improvement of Sixth and M streets.

The North Aberdeen bridge was ordered repaired under the supervision of the city engineer.

**WANT \$600,000 FOR JETTY**

Grays Harbor Mill Men Start Campaign to Secure Large Appropriation for the Work.

Fifty lumber manufacturers on Grays harbor made a trip to the lower harbor as a preliminary to the campaign that will be waged by the combined interests of Grays harbor for an additional appropriation of \$600,000 from congress for the improvement of the lower waterway.

The trip included an inspection of the jetty work so far accomplished. Several thousand dollars have already been subscribed by local merchants and capitalists to promote the harbor improvements and to defray the expenses of the campaign.

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
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
